Sound Vehicles
Licensed and
Regulated

Sound and advertising vehicles are now regulated in County territory as the result of an ordinance adopted by the Board of Supervisors at Tuesday's meeting.

According to Supervisor Raymond V. Darby, the ordinance prohibits operation of any sound vehicle within three hundred feet of any hospital, school, church or other place of worship; upon any public highway between the hours of 4:30 p.m. and 9:00 a.m. of the following day; or upon any public highway on any Sunday; and prohibits the operation of any advertising vehicle upon any public highway between the hours of 4:30 p.m. and 9 o'clock a.m. of the following day, or on any Sunday.

The term "sound vehicle" does not include a vehicle equipped with a siren or horn designed and used for the purpose of warning traffic, nor the incidental sounding of a horn or bell by a tradesman or peddler.

The ordinance also requires a permit for the operating of any sound or advertising vehicle, and prescribes procedure and fixes license rates.

Telephone Book
Use Explained
By Company

Cooperation of all telephone subscribers in the Harbor area in saving old telephone directories until after the number change and the conversion to dial operation on July 15 is asked by Floyd Y. Snyder, district telephone manager, as distribution of the 1945 directories began today.

"Old telephone books are usually collected at the time of the delivery of the new directories," Snyder says, "but here in the Harbor area the telephone company will not collect old books because these will be needed by telephone users until after July 14." Snyder urges everyone to refer to the old books until midnight of July 14, and after then always to use the new directory for any doubtful telephone numbers. "We advise that the old telephone directories be contributed to the scrap paper drive because our nation still needs waste paper," Snyder adds.

Work of distribution of the 26,000 copies of the new telephone directory to all Harbor area subscribers beginning today will be undertaken by a specially trained crew of telephone employees aided by students and parttime workers. It is planned that all copies of the new book will be delivered before the evening of July 14.

"Use of the new directory whenever doubt arises about a telephone number is one way that Harbor area residents can help aid the war effort," manager Snyder emphasizes, "because correctly placed and completely up-to-date telephone power and equipment and help in clearing the wires or vital war messages."

Christian Church
Convention to Be
Held in L.A.

Local residents who are members of the Christian church are now laying plans for participation in the fifty-seventh annual state convention of Christian churches, slated for July 24-29 at the Wilshire Christian church in Los Angeles.

They will join with members of 135 other Christian churches located throughout the Southland. Combined membership of the denomination, which is sometimes known as the Disciples of Christ, totals 50,000 in Southern California.

Dr. Ralph W. Sockman, of New York, minister of Christ church (Methodist), conductor of the National Radio Pulpit, of NBC, will be featured in a series of addresses.

Welfare Study
Will Benefit
Torrance

Demands for community health and welfare programs throughout the 34 cities and towns associated in the Los Angeles Area War Chest and Community Chest, has brought about expansion of the Research Division of the Welfare Council of Metropolitan Los Angeles, it was announced this week. Torrance as a member city will benefit.

Dr. Genevieve W. Carter, formerly research assistant of the Institute of Child Welfare at the University of California, will direct the program, according to announcement by Mrs. Sumner Spaulding, Council president, and Dr. J. Harold Williams, chairman of the Research Division committee. Associated will be Miss Helen Dean, research consultant.

According to the announcement, the Research Division will be responsible for surveys and studies from which to plan adequate health and welfare services for the communities and to avoid duplication of effort. Needs and trends in welfare services for the approximately 2,350,000 persons in the area covered by the Chest will be considered by Dr. Carter in her program.

Graduate of the University of New Mexico and Columbia University, with graduate work at the University of California at Berkeley Dr. Carter was formerly Superintendent of Education with the Relocation Authority.

The Research Division, which Dr. Carter will head has been officially designated by the U. S. Children's Bureau to secure social welfare statistics for the area. The Department has recently published a Directory of Health and Welfare Agencies in Los Angeles County after securing information from more than 500 groups in the area. The Directory will be used as a text book on Social Resources at the University of Southern California.
