Except for a few larger sub-basins cut off from direct re-plenishment by percolation from streams draining 'mountain wa-tersheds, the ground water lev-els of the Southern California Coastal Plain continue relatively high, as a result of the 1937-44 lows an eightyear wet period (1937-1944), which averaged 31 per cent above normal, constitu-ing the best sustained abnormal-ly wet years shown by local rec-ords. 
