In Marriage in Ceremony Here

St. Andrew's Episcopal Church

Was the setting for the wedding Friday afternoon of Catherine C. Clegg of San Francisco and Lieut. Frederic P. Shidler, medical corps, U. S. Navy. The double ring ceremony was performed by the Reverend Parker of St. Cross Episcopal Church, Hermosa Beach in the presence of a few intimate friends and relatives. The church was beautifully decorated in white with gladiolus, larkspur, delphinium and white candles. Music was supplied by the organist of the Hermosa Beach church.

Lovely in a navy blue suit with ashes of roses accessories, and carrying a bouquet of pink roses and bouvardia, the bride was given in marriage by her father, Maurice A. Clegg of Port Hueneme, Calif. Mrs. John A. Shidler, charming in pink crepe with matching accessories, carrying a bouquet of pink pom pom dahlias, attended her as matron of honor. Edwin Ohlsen of Hollywood, a fraternity brother of the bridegroom, was best man.

A graduate of Washington University, the bride received her master's degree at Columbia University, where she majored in social science. Volunteering as a Red Cross social service worker in Washington, D.C., she was assigned foreign field service and spent two years in the South Pacific. It was while stationed on the Russell Islands that she met Lieutenant Shidler.

The bridegroom, son of the late Dr. George P. Shidler, attended school in Torrance and graduated from Stanford Medical School. He was on the staff of the Stanford Lane Hospital in San Francisco, where he intends to return after the war.

Senior surgeon on the U.S.S. Pinkney when he was hit by a suicide bomber, he was commended for his action in completing an operation under way when the ship was hit. Lt. Shidler has eight battle stars for duty in Tinian, Pelelieu, Lingayen Bay, Tarawa, Leyte, Iwo Jima, Okinawa and Saipan campaigns. He spent two years in the South Pacific.
