## Taxpayers Warn Of Danger in School Spending

"Danger that the new state money for elementary school districts, voted by the people in November, 1944, and available for the first time for 1945-46, will be absorbed by increased spending, rather than being used to reduce local property taxes, is plain in tentative school budget proposals," California Taxpayers' association said today, urging citizen attendance at school budget hearings.

State support for elementary school districts will be \$65,937,000 for the coming school year, 1945-46, compared with \$50,676,686 for last year.

Under the law passed by the 1945 legislature to provide for the distribution of "old" and "new" state aid to elementary school districts, every elementary district in the state will receive at least \$2,250 per teacher unit. Last year, state aid to districts was on the basis of at least \$1,770 per teacher unit.

"The increased amount of state aid to elementary school districts is, in most communities, large enough to have a major effect on the local school tax rate, if taxpayers insist that school spending programs be held in line, rather than being ballooned to absorb the 'new' state money," the Taxpayers' association declared.

"The public hearing on the local school budget is to be held during the first week in August. It is the time for citizen discussion of the school budget and the resultant tax rate on property in the school district. This year, with the increase in state support of elementary schools, it is particularly important."

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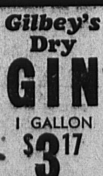

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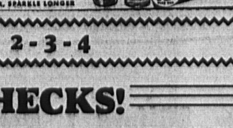

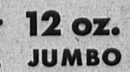
