School Budget Due for Adoption at Meet Tomorrow; Big Increase Seen

Los Angeles city schools' tentative budget underwent its annual public airing Thursday with a chance of remaining at its record high of \$51,915,572 when it is adopted Aug. 10.

This would mean a tax rate of between \$1.90 and \$2.00 per \$100 assessed valuation, which Torrance must pay as long as the local schools remain under control of Los Angeles city politics.

The public hearing—referred to as a "democratic gesture" in one speech by a taxpayers' spokesman—lasted for 90 minutes at John H. Francis Polytechnic High School.

Board of Education members, Supt. Vierling Kersey and his chief assistants heard "pro" and "con" arguments ranging from the statistical to the oratorical. Most of those who spoke against the budget, chiefly representatives of teachers' organizations, said it was too small. Two who spoke for taxpayers' and citizens' groups said it was at least \$2,542,300 too high.

Pleas for Cuts Stand
Referring to four budget reductions proposed July 27, Ed F. Thompson, secretary of the Los Angeles Citizens' Budget Committee, told the board that "we respectfully reiterate our previous recommendations."

Chief among his recommendations were removal of \$1,331,080 set up for an additional step in the teacher salary schedule and reduction of the capital outlay budget from \$3,515,000 to \$2,500,000.

Supt. Kersey said that in the tentative budget "it was neces-

sary to reduce the requests of his division heads for added services by more than \$3,250,000."

William A. Pixley, managing director of the Property Owners' Association, said he hoped the board would reverse "its traditional practice" of "sticking to its original tentative budget" and "hold the line against inflation" by not making "lavish salary increases." Harold Orr, representing the Los Angeles Federation of Teachers, said that salary increases in the budget "help only those in the top bracket and not those in the lower brackets."

A similar objection was raised by Dr. Philip J. Schessinger of the Citizens Committee for Better Education.

Speak for Budget
Those who spoke for the Budget included Dr. Merle E. Fish, pastor of Pico Heights Christian Church; Daniel Johnston of the National Labor Bureau, representing the Associated Teachers of Los Angeles; Laurence McCormick of the Communist Political Association; Glen Behrmer of the Los Angeles Elementary Teachers' Club; Daniel Sigal of Roosevelt Evening High School and Ray Clapsdale of the 17th District American Legion.
