Churches Will Unite In 15th Annual Religious Education Week Program

Protestant churches and other religious agencies of rural and urban areas of the United States and Canada will unite in the observance of the 15th annual Religious Education Week, September 30 to October 7, giving emphasis to the building of Christian character, it was announced by Dr. Roy G. Ross, general secretary of the International Council of Religious Education, sponsor of the program.

Using the theme, "Character for a Free World," 40 Protestant denominations and 183 state, provincial and city councils of churches and religious education will cooperate for community-wide observances.

"America today enjoys an enviable position among the world of nations," Dr. Ross declared. "Her place in the life of the world has stemmed from the fact that her institutions, social patterns, and policies have been founded on spiritual foundations. Her ability to maintain world leadership will depend upon the quality of her internal life and the extent to which she is true to her Christian heritage."

"Through their local schools and their inter-church community organizations for Christian education, the people of each town or city have an opportunity during Religious Education Week to make that heritage live anew in the lives of their children, thus bringing life's greatest blessing to them both as individuals and as citizens of tomorrow's world," he avers.

In most towns and cities, Rally Day or Promotion Day on the opening Sunday will emphasize educational evangelism as church schools renew efforts to increase enrollment and attendance. Community interest will be developed through week-day programs including launching of leadership education schools on Monday, family nights on Tuesday, inter-church fellowship meetings Thursday, and denominational or inter-church youth rallies on Friday. The week's observance will climax on World Communion Sunday with emphasis on "The unifying power of World Christian Fellowship to build a free world."

Gordon Russell Is Winner of Bronze Star

For outstanding heroism on Iwo Jima, Marine Cpl. Gordon T. Russell, 19, son of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Russell of 1319 Crenshaw blvd., Torrance, has been awarded the Bronze Star Medal, the Marine Corps announced this week.

The 19-year-old Leatherneck volunteered to go 30 yards beyond his own lines under intense enemy mortar and rifle fire to aid in the rescue of 12 wounded comrades lying in the line of Jap fire.

Russell, a veteran of the Saipan-Tinian campaign, was a student of Torrance High school prior to enlisting in the Marine Corps.

Only Two Cases Of Botulism In L. A. County

With but two cases of botulism reported in Los Angeles County up to the middle of the home canning season, continued care in the preparation and use of home canned fruits and vegetables was urged by Dr. Roy O. Gilbert, assistant Los Angeles County health officer.

Every housewife using steam pressure cookers should have technical knowledge concerning proper temperatures for different foods and containers, and health officer cautioned, and the cooker should be kept in good mechanical order.

He also warned that home canners should not become careless or take short cuts at this point in the canning season, just because they have not had any spoilage in their previously canned food.

"It is not possible to tell that the food is capable of causing botulism by looking at it or smelling it," the doctor pointed out, "and non-acid foods, although properly prepared, should be boiled 15 minutes even before tasting."
