

WALTERIA WATER DISTRICT FORMATION DELAYED

Efforts of Dr. L. M. Ellinwood and members of his family to keep the 960 acres of the Ellinwood ranch, potential homestead for 15,000 persons, out of the proposed water district to serve southwest Torrance have delayed consideration of the formation of the district for 30 days.

At the meeting of the City Council last Friday, the law firm of Murphy & Davis, representing Dr. Ellinwood, protested by letter the proposed inclusion of the Ellinwood property in the water district being formed on petition of Walteria residents and property owners. The letter asked the formation of the district and the proposed election be held in abeyance for at least 30 days while a study is being made of the proposal.

Construction On Navy Plant Being Rushed

Building of Torrance's United States Navy—Material Redistribution Center is proceeding on schedule and will be able to take up most of the slack in employment, particularly if men involved are veterans.

TWO WEEKS VACATION

E. Drake Jr., officer in charge, who declared that the need for the big \$5,000,000 center being constructed on a 91-acre site is just as great now as it was before the end of the war.

Veterans will be given first choice for jobs on the payroll of the plant which will employ some 350 men. All kinds of craftsmen and tradesmen are needed, including skilled, semi-skilled and unskilled labor, Drake said, but the Civil Service will take applications from none but veterans for the present.

The administration and facility buildings, including the garages, are about completed, at the base. Fire walls are being constructed in the giant 202-foot by 602-foot warehouses, and steel will be erected as soon as the fire walls have seasoned and the forms are removed.

Surfacing with black top is about completed. Admiral Royal E. Ingersoll, commander of the Western Sea Frontier, said that the Navy plans no extensive cutbacks on its Pacific Coast activities. Some \$12,000,000 worth of work is under way on Terminal Island. "Due to the need for maintaining support of Navy forces afloat and ashore in the Pa-

cific," said Adm. Ingersoll, "a large and continuing job faces civilian workers and service personnel in the Navy's west coast activities, and no major force reduction is contemplated."

In a statement to the com-

mandants of the 11th, 12th and 13 Naval Districts the admiral said:

"Even when most of the per-

sonnel and supplies overseas

have been returned to this coun-

try, work will continue in the

overhauling, reconverting and maintaining of the largest Navy and maritime tonnage in the world, and in the salvaging, storing and disposing of equipment and supplies, including surplus aircraft and ordnance."
