Blackout was in effect every night. In the long weeks of the cam-paign, Kamikaze suicide planes, the Japs sent high-spied boats loaded with explosives. To meet these attacks, gun crews were sometimes - called out several times a night. The pre-invasion bombardment was halted early on LDay — Easter Sunday-for the troops to make their landings. Church services on the cruiser were broadcast over the ship's loud-spaskers to the men at their battle stations.
