## Rodent Control Film Will Be Shown in City

The Torrance premiere of the new rodent control film "The Filth Columnist" produced for the Los Angeles county health department will be held in the Torrance Health Center, 2300 Carson st., Friday at 3 p.m., according to Hugh McMillan, area chief sanitary inspector for the Torrance health district.

"The Filth Columnist," a technical film originally produced in Honolulu under the title "Our Enemy, the Rat," was re-filmed in Los Angeles, using local scenes and characters.

One of the problems encountered in making the California version in June was having sufficient sunny days in which to photograph the avocado groves, poultry ranches, and other outdoor places infested by rats.

Local, city and civic organization heads have been invited to the premiere, 20-minute film, following which the film will be available free of charge for showing to groups and organizations interested in cutting down the rat population in Los Angeles county.

## Way Cleared to Annex Palos Verdes College Site to City of Los Angeles

A clear way is now seen for the Los Angeles Board of Education to annex 30 acres under consideration in the Palos Verdes area for the new Harbor Junior College, according to a statement today by Glen E. Lucas, supervisor of the Palos Verdes reservoir and Metropolitan water line between Palos Verdes and Eagle Rock.

Lucas said he had been in conference with the general manager of the Metropolitan Water District, Julian Hinds, who said that the water district would not stand in the way of the creation of a shoe-string strip including the Palos Verdes reservoir acreage in order to annex the Palos Verdes College site to the City of Los Angeles.

Lucas, also an owner of land to be included in the shoe-string strip, stated that he would do what he could to further the annexation of the college site to the city.

This brings the shoe-string strip right down to the United States reservation on Western ave., which is already partly included in the City of Los Angeles. Lucas' property runs from the metropolitan reservoir to Western ave. along the south border of the Federal Housing Property. The acreage being considered for use by the Board of Education for the Junior College is adjacent to and on the west of the Palos Verdes reservoir.

Robert B. Biemer, chief of operation and maintenance of the Metropolitan Water district, also expressed his opinion that there should be no difficulty in annexing the Palos Verdes reservoir area to the City of Los Angeles, providing it would serve a good purpose. However, he said that he did not feel that the managers should initiate the petition. It was learned also the municipal reservoir is tax free and would not be affected one way or the other, from this standpoint.

Up until this present development the main objection to the Palos Verdes site, as it was understood through Roy Becker, of the Los Angeles School Board, was the fact that the Palos Verdes property was not within the city limits. Becker stated that the Board of Education would not be interested in any property not a part of the City of Los Angeles. Previous experience of the school board, he said, was such as to prove the undesirability of accepting property outside the city for important school buildings. This

According to Fire Chief J. E. McMaster, the salvaging of paper and other materials in the home garage is a fire hazard. This is due, he explained, to the possibilities of this scrap igniting from the car's exhaust.

McMasters also pointed out that rags frequently contain furniture polish and other cleaning oils, all of which have a very definite tendency towards igniting spontaneously.

It was advised that all discarded clothing and other materials be collected together from that nook in the garage and turned over to those making a business of salvage.

Garden hose in many cases has been used effectively on grass or roof fires, he said, and has proved to be the extinguisher of interior fires in the home.

Where the origin of the fire is grease burning on the kitchen range, however, water thrown upon it will result in a large burst of flame and the splattering of grease on persons in the room, and should never be used in these cases, he said.




