





**Extra Red Points Offered Cafes** In Distress

In Distress Restaurants, some of which have been hard pressed for enough red points to carry them through the July-August allot-ment period – a period in which the OPA reduced ration allot-ments about 20 per cent-will be able to "borrow" additional red points in certain cases, George Junker, OPA district ra-tioning representative in charge of restaurants, announced. -Repayment of the loan, Junker explained, should be made in four equal installments with the September-October allotment per-iod.
