Red Cross Officer Tells Urgent Need For Production Help

In a recent visit to Torrance Chapter, American Red Cross, Mrs. O. C. Welbourn, vice chairman of volunteer special services in charge of this area, outlined the following requirements for Torrance Production rooms, as follows:

"8,000 garments for hospital use; 30,000 kit bags, 25,000 convalescent kit bags, 50,000 garments for Philippine Island War Relief, 12,000 garments for Los Angeles County hospital, 5,000 pounds of yarn are now on hand for articles for hospital use, 5,000 pounds more are on the way. All Home Service expects to increase and its needs will have to be cared for. All patients in L. A. County Hospital, who are members of service men's families, are entitled to help from Red Cross," Mrs. Welbourn states.

Mrs. Maude Lock, Production chairman for this branch, asks the cooperation of her fine workers in this emergency and points out that even one or two hours' consistent work will be of great benefit in reaching the unit's goal.

Red Cross Services Peacetime Trends Revealed at Meet

"Now peace is won in both Europe and the Pacific, added emphasis will be placed on Home Service and hospital services of the Los Angeles Red Cross."

Gurney E. Newlin, Chairman, Los Angeles Chapter, so declared at the emergency meeting of volunteer and staff workers gathered at the Wilshire Ebell Theater recently when future trends of Red Cross services were outlined. Pointing out that Red Cross must be ever ready to assist returned veterans, Newlin announced that the program in Home Service departments will increase in importance upon the release of more and more men who must be fitted into a postwar world.

"Services to American men serving with the occupational forces, veterans, and their families must be continued until the emergency ceases," the Red Cross head said. "Hospital services, too, must be increased to meet the needs of men who are still recovering from battle scars of war and are being returned from evacuation hospitals overseas to army and navy hospitals here."

Announcing plans affecting approximately 25,000 volunteers, Mrs. Edwin Loeb, chairman, volunteer special services, disclosed that the present volunteer program will be maintained. Arts and Skills, Gray Ladies, and Staff Assistance were named as corps upon which the burden of establishing an increased hospital program will fall.

Mrs. Loeb revealed that services to be maintained at a before-peacetime level are canteen, motor corps, production, and nurse's aides. With its program already curtailed before final victory in the Pacific, the surgical dressings corps will still continue to fulfill special orders of military hospitals in this area, she announced.

Other services expected to increase within the next six months, it was revealed, include Camp and Hospital, and health and educational services, which include expanded first aid class programs in home nursing, first aid, water safety, accident prevention and nutrition.

Programs that will face no immediate change include disaster preparedness and relief, fund raising, Junior Red Cross, college units, army and navy wives activities, and services to the armed forces. Nurse recruitment and Blood Donor Service, with the exception of type "O" blood donations, will be the only Red Cross services immediately curtailed.

Extra Red Points Offered Cafes In Distress

Restaurants, some of which have been hard pressed for enough red points to carry them through the July-August allotment period—a period in which the OPA reduced ration allotments about 20 per cent—will be able to "borrow" additional red points in certain cases, George Junker, OPA district rationing representative in charge of restaurants, announced.

Repayments of the loan, Junker explained, should be made in four equal installments with the September-October allotment period. This, he said, would prove no hardship, since anticipated more liberal red point values will do much to ease cafes' supply problems.
