Softball Fans at Torrance Park

The Torrance Industrial Softball League, which has been featuring an 8-team double-line tournament since Sept. 6, will go into its third round tonight at Torrance Park.

So far the games have been battles of the pitchers starting from the first game of the series.

The first, a seven-inning game, was between Redondo Cabinet Shop and Dow Chemical Co., with the Cabinet makers winning by a score of 4 to 1.

In this tilt, the burly bat of Gar Johnson beat out a home run, scoring Kennedy and Bill Johnson of the R.C.S., in the very first inning. Stolen bases all the way around by Dow's catcher, Donaghue, who reached first on an error, netted his team their only run.

The second game of the evening was another pitchers' duel between the Northrop Flyers and Inglewood Recreation (20-30 Club) with Kratofil of Northrop out-pitching Pryer for a 2 to 1 win. This game had fans yelling hoarse for nine innings, and neither team able to register on the scoreboard until the final inning.
