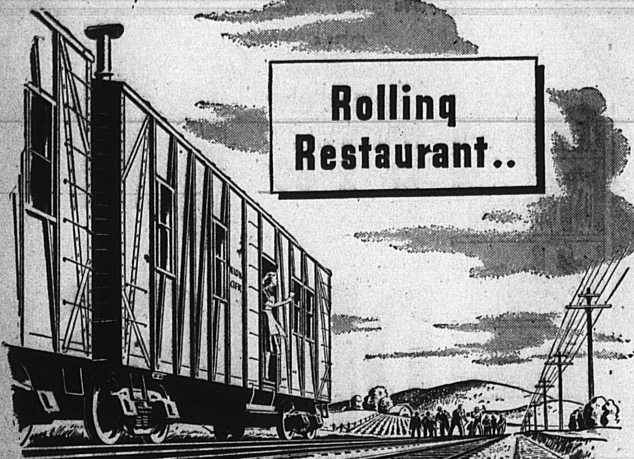

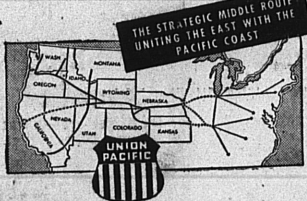

Noodle and Cottage Cheese Casserole

| 1 (4-oz.) pkg. wide noodles | 1 cup Golden State Cottage Cheese |
| 2 tbsp. Golden State Butter | 1 tsp. A-1 Sauce |
| 2 tbsp. flour | 1/2 tsp. pepper |
| 1 cup Golden State Milk | 1/2 tsp. salt |
| | 1 tbsp. chopped parsley |

Grated Parmesan-type cheese

1. Cook noodles in boiling salted water until tender, and drain. 2. Combine remaining ingredients; add to noodles, and mix well. 3. Turn into a greased casserole, and sprinkle cheese and chopped parsley generously over the top. 4. Bake in moderate oven (375° F.) for about 30 minutes. Serves 6.

Creamed Fish Casserole

| 2 cups cooked fish | 2 tbsp. chopped celery leaves |
| 2 tbsp. Golden State Butter | 1 tsp. lemon juice |
| 3 tbsp. flour | 1/2 tsp. grated lemon rind |
| 1 tsp. salt | 1/2 cup rolled potato chips |
| 1 1/2 cups Golden State Milk | |
1. Cut fish into cubes. 2. Melt butter, blend flour and salt. Gradually add milk, and cook, stirring constantly, until sauce is thick and creamy. 3. Add fish, celery leaves, lemon juice, and rind. Fill individual casseroles with potato chips. Place in pan of hot water and bake in moderate oven (350° F.) for 30 minutes. Before serving garnish with lemon slices and parsley. Serves 4.
