### War Council Powers Transferred To Governor; New Disaster Set-up

Under the new law, cities and counties are authorized to ex-tend "mutual aid" for fire and police protection. In cases of "extreme emergency." the Gov-ernor may take over the di-rection of any State governme-tal agency to cope with flood, fire, earthquake, pestilence, sab-otage or riot. Labor controver-sies are specifically excluded by the act.

sies are specifically excluded by the act. Pre-war laws confined fire de-partments and law enforcement officers to their local jurisdic-tions, Governor Warren pointed out. The State Disaster plan, he said, "makes possible the inte-gration of the activities of all agencies concerned with the pro-tection of life and property, making peacetime use of a war-time lesson in cooperation." Declaration of a state of ex-treme emergency would have to be upheld by the State Disaster Council within seven days and the Legislature within 30 days, or otherwise it would lapse, ac-cording to the new statute.
