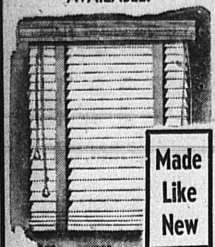


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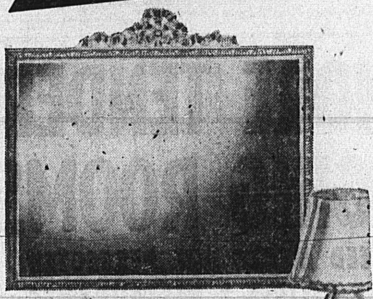

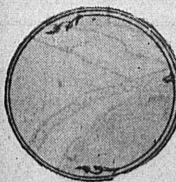

ter said the contract they are attempting to force the chain stores to negotiate "has no applicability to our operations." He said that it was drawn for baby shops, florists, novelty stores and other small units where conditions are entirely unlike those of the chain stores. He said the stores cannot be reopened until a suitable contract is negotiated.

There is no dispute between the employers and clerks' union over wages and hours. The principal difference in opinion centers around the insistence on the part of the store owners of inclusion of an arbitration clause in the contract, which the union is resisting.

The resolution of the Chamber is quoted in full as follows:

"A resolution: Whereas, retail sales in this community have been seriously handicapped by the closing of several retail establishments; and;

"Whereas, this closing has seriously handicapped the entire community in obtaining merchandise vital to its livelihood; and;

"Whereas, our employed people are confronted with great difficulties in supplying their normal needs locally; and,

"Whereas, a large number of our employed are thus deprived of their normal pursuits for earning a living, now, there-
fore:

"BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board of Directors of the Torrance Chamber of Commerce does hereby call upon all interested parties concerned with a situation that causes our retail establishments to remain closed to use their good efforts to conciliate any differences that may exist so that our citizens may again have available to them the trade conveniences so necessary to their welfare during this period of readjustment. Passed this day 16th October, 1945."

of groundwater from the West Basin is about 69,478 acre feet and is close to twice the estimated replenishment. The present annual overdraft is said to be of the magnitude of 29,500 to 37,700 acre feet.

These accumulated conditions point to the ultimate failure of the groundwater supply throughout the entire area, unless remedial measures are started, and filing of the lawsuit in Superior court is said to be the first step to this end.

While Torrance wells have not been affected as yet by the saline intrusion, the wells are not safe as long as the overdraft continues, according to Manager William Stanger, of the water department, who asked the city to become plaintiffs to the suit.

Meanwhile, the city approved the map fixing the boundaries of the proposed Municipal Water district in Southwest Torrance. The area involved is west of Crenshaw blvd. and south of Sepulveda blvd., taking in all territory in that section of Torrance except Hollywood Riviera. The council postponed for another week action on the proposals for establishment of a water district in North Torrance.

Two-Way Radio
Authorized
For Waleria

To overcome difficulties incident to lack of direct telephone communications between the Waleria district and the Torrance police and fire departments, the City Council Tuesday night decided to buy a two-way radio set for installation in the fire station in Waleria.

Thus, residents of the Waleria and Hollywood Riviera district, served by the Redondo Beach telephone exchange, will be able to call the Waleria fire station when in need of police or fire protection, and the calls will be relayed immediately by radio to the central stations. This will save an average of 10 minutes per call, members of the council said.

The police department will pay for the purchase and installation of the radio, and the fire department will maintain the equipment which now is available without priority.

The initial cost will be approximately \$350, it was said. Other sections of Torrance are served by the Gardena and Lomita telephone exchanges, it has been pointed out, and if the radio communication system works out for the Waleria district, it might be used in North Torrance and in the vicinity of Torrance airport.

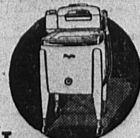

and across the dance floor to the stage to which he was summoned by Captain R. L. Lewellen, reception committee member and "manager" of the Olympic hero. He found his progress difficult, as old friends and new acquaintances sought his arm and hand as he made his way toward the stage. He was particularly popular with the veterans present.

The captain was his typical, quiet and unassuming self in an interview at the "mike", especially in contrast with his brother, Chief Specialist Pete Zamperini, former Torrance High school coach, who received a round of cheers from the young people at the party as he complimented the school for finally winning a game from Narbonne high, Lomita.

There were many other heroes went unheeded, one being that of Chief Aviation Machinist Guy Rowell, who was sunk three times, each time on a carrier, the Hornet, the old Lexington and the Liscomb Bay.

When the next party will be held will depend upon the rate of return of veterans from overseas, it was said.
