Torrance City Dads To Be Done In Green Velour

The City Council of Torrance will be done in green velour, for the benefit of the audience in the council chambers.

The city fathers decided Tuesday night to spend \$80 for a velour curtain to hang at the front of the chambers, behind the councilmen's table.

Will City Clerk A. H. Bartlett explained at the request of Councilman N. H. Cuel, improve the acoustics and thus permit the audience to better hear what the councilmen say. Also, it was said, the curtain will improve the appearance of the council table, and councilmen, as seen from the audience.

Local Aluminum Plants Subject Of Conference

Reduced power rates will be offered the aluminum industry in an attempt to attract permanent operators, a Senate subcommittee was told last week.

Excessive power rates which the Los Angeles Bureau of Power and Light charged to the Aluminum Co. of America in operating its Torrance plant were largely responsible for the early closing of the \$24,000,000 unit.

That it may be reopened by eastern interests was indicated last week in an article in the Torrance Herald. The cost of power is said to be the influencing factor involved in utilizing both the Bohn Aluminum and Brass Corp. and ALCOA plants.

Arthur Troy, an official of Eastern Metal Products Corp., recently inspected the Torrance plant and expressed his interest in acquiring them provided the power rates can be lowered sufficient to make it worth while.

As President Truman expressed hope that the Federal government will not have to subsidize competitors of the Aluminum Co. of America, representatives of the Los Angeles Power Bureau challenged figures about electricity rate structures and prepared to tell Congress an "integrated" aluminum industry will receive the benefit of special schedules until the various plants get on their feet.

The Los Angeles proposition, which is conditioned on establishment of a rolling mill-furnishing sheet and plates wanted by aircraft manufacturers, will not involve Federal subsidies.

An offer to buy the Torrance aluminum reduction plant was disclosed at the Senate hearing, although Federal officials are doubtful the \$24,000,000 project is economically practicable. Troy told the Senate group his firm is anxious to buy the plant in order to enter the West Coast Market.

Bids For New Street Work Are Opened

Bids for resurfacing of several streets in Torrance were opened by the City Council Tuesday night and referred to the city engineer and attorney for checking and report.

For resurfacing of Arlington ave. from Lincoln to Sepulveda blvd., Arlington ave. from Border to a point 300 feet north of Dominguez st., Andree ave. from Carson st. to 222nd st., and Gramercy ave. from Carson st. to 222nd st., Griffin Company was low bidder, at \$7,548.

Next low bidder was Warren Southwest Co., \$7770; Sully Miller Co., \$8599.50, and Los Angeles Paving Co., \$9213.00.

The contract will be awarded at an adjourned meeting Tuesday, Oct. 30, at 7:45 p.m.

Garbage Service In Torrance Is Hit At Meeting

It was pointed out that George Green, the contractor, is attempting to do his best, but that he is having difficulty with his men. Green will be asked to meet the council at an early meeting, it was decided.

Hit And Run Charged In Sailor's Death

Raymond Cissne, 23, sailor attached to the Third Fleet, on shore leave Friday night, was found dead at 2:30 a. m. Oct. 19, on Huntington st. near Hawthorne blvd., by Torrance police officers, Sgt. Bill Evans and Jerry Enfield.

Evidence obtained pointed out that Cissne was the victim of a hit-run driver and 30 minutes later these officers, acting on a hunch, arrested Chester F. Voges, 39, 4100 W. 158th st., an employee of the Inglewood Farms, charging him with hit and run.

Police reported that Voges denied the charge when confronted at the dairy, but later confessed when shown evidence in the form of skin and hair still clinging to his car. In a statement to the police, Voges said that the sailor was lying in the road when he first sighted him, but fearing his car would run over the victim if he turned, he decided to straddle the body, thinking the machine was "high enough to clear. Police records quoted Voges as saying that he was too scared to stop after striking Cissne.

Voges was released on \$2,000 bond pending his preliminary hearing set for Nov. 9.
