Rolling Hills Would Annex 150 Acres of Land To Los Angeles

Dr. H. L. Snow and Rolling Hills interests will continue their efforts to have the new Harbor district junior college located in East Rolling Hills, even to the extent of allowing annexation of the 150 acres of the tract to the City of Los Angeles.

This the doctor said last week after the city attorney of Los Angeles had ruled the city could not annex the land for school purposes because it included some government land.

Dr. Snow said: "In all probability the way is still perfectly clear to annex the proposed East Rolling Hills Junior College site to the City of Los Angeles. If the School Board decides they will accept the 30 acres offered them free for the school site, they will be requested to use the money already appropriated for the site purchase as a local student loan fund."

"Yesterday's decision by the city attorney that the originally proposed shoestring strip could not legally be annexed to the City of Los Angeles should make no difference as far as availability of the East Rolling Hills site for the Junior College is concerned."

"The city's legal council made its decision on the grounds of a peculiar state law."

"This law, the City Attorney informed us, was passed in order to prevent annexation to the city of any land which would not be under the city's control. He stated that the few feet of naval reservation that were to be included in the mile long strip would be under U. S. Government control and not under that of the City of Los Angeles."

"One member of the City Council interested in the site closer to Wilmington, said that 30 acres of East Rolling Hills land wasn't enough to make the annexation self supporting from a city taxation standpoint. Therefore, last night a conference of East Rolling Hills property owners was held. Over 150 acres of East Rolling Hills land was pledged for inclusion in one of several proposed shoestring strips running either north or south of the U. S. Naval Reservation."

"A petition to annex this land to the City of Los Angeles will be signed by owners of the 150 acres, provided the school board decides favorably on the East Rolling Hills site for the new Harbor Junior College."

Local Firm To Present Watch To Zamperini

Captain Louis Zamperini, AAF, Torrance hero of Olympic fame who survived an army airplane crash, 47 days on an open raft and years of cruel Jap imprisonment, will get the watch he said he wished for when he was first interviewed on Okinawa shortly after his return to American control.

Gary's Jewelers will present a chronometer watch in Torrance's appreciation for his outstanding service to his country Friday night at the Police and Firemen's show, if it is possible for Captain Zamperini to be present, or later if he cannot attend.

He is now in an army hospital undergoing routine physical checkup.

1 1/2 cups green beans, cut in 1/2-inch slices
2 cups celery, chopped
1/2 cup onion, chopped
Cook beans and celery in small amount of heated water. After 10 minutes, add sliced frankfurter and cook till vegetables are tender. Add drained mixture to white sauce. Heat thoroughly. Serve in baskets made as follows: With large cookie cutter, cut bread into rounds. Place 3 rings on each of the 4 rounds. Brush with melted butter. Place 1/2 cup of the vegetable mixture in each round. Bake in hot oven, 350 deg. F. or until golden brown. Fill with creamed vegetables. Serve immediately. Four servings.
