Family Allotments To Be Continued For Peacetime Army

Torrance-Lomita area is the new target of AAF bombardier Lt. Henry A. Glover, who has arrived in San Pedro on a special assignment for the Army.

A veteran of bomber raids over Germany, Glover is directing the campaign to obtain hundreds of volunteers for the Regular Army from the San Pedro area, in the Army's current drive to obtain "Guardians of Victory."

"I'm confident many young men are going to sign up," he said. "Army work is always interesting, and the working conditions are better than most jobs in civilian life, with 30 days paid vacation each year."

The non-commissioned officer who will man the new Army enlistment station, Room 202, San Pedro Postoffice building, is Sgt. Frank W. O'Connor. He revealed that any volunteer may select his own branch of service and the area of the world in which he wishes to serve. Enlistments are now accepted for one year, 18 months, two years, and three years.

Veterans who abandon civilian life in favor of the Army may hit the jackpot for sums up to one thousand dollars when they reenlist, Lt. Glover said. He added that a new law, now in effect, also extends family allotment payments and the benefits of the GI Bill of Rights to all persons who volunteer for the peacetime service.

Enlistments are authorized for the following periods, at the option of the person enlisting—3 years, 2 years and 18 months. In addition, any qualified and acceptable member of the Army of the United States who has performed active service for a period of not less than 6 months, is authorized, upon his application to enlist for a period of 1 year.

Enlistments are now authorized for 17 year olds who are found qualified, physically and otherwise, for general military service. Parents consent is necessary for all 17 year olds who wish to enlist.

Men honorably discharged and enlisted within 20 days of discharge will be enlisted in the grade held at the time of discharge. Men honorably discharged on or after 12 May 1945 and before November 1945 will be enlisted in the grade held at the time of discharge, providing enlistment is effected prior to 21 November 1945.

New rules governing the reenlistment 90 day furloughs, 20 year retirement, reenlistment bonus, free mail, benefits of the GI Bill of Rights and choice of arm or service and Theater of Operations are among the many benefits offered now by the United States Army.

The Military Personnel Procurement Office in San Pedro is located in Room 202, Postoffice Building. The office is open 8:30 A. M. to 4:30 P. M. daily. Saturday, 8:30 A. M. to 12:00 noon and closed Sundays.

Full information can be obtained from the enlistment station in the Postoffice building at San Pedro. Office hours are 8:30 A. M. to 4:30 P. M.

Lt. and Mrs. Glover are living at 2201 Ximeno ave., Long Beach. His home originally was West Monroe, Louisiana.

James L. Sharp Starts Cruise Aboard Trainer

James L. Sharp, Torrance, was today getting his sea-legs aboard the "American Seafarer," according to a report from Commander William E. Porter, USMS, skipper of the trim-gray-clad 8,000 U. S. Maritime Service training ship.

Over 400 trainees comprised the crew which shoved off yesterday on a two-weeks' cruise out into the blue Pacific, climaxing apprentice seaman training begun aboard the American Seafarer, which berths at Pier 19, Long Beach harbor.

Emphasizing the need for trained Merchant seamen to bring our G. I.'s back home again and to deliver supplies to the needy nations, Captain Porter said: "Never in her long career has the American Seafarer filled a more important assignment than this one of providing actual sea experience to future Merchant seamen. And never before has there been a greater opportunity for young men to train for a peacetime career in America's Merchant Marine."

Men from 17 to 50 are still being accepted for training. Applicants should apply at the U. S. Maritime Service, Enrolling Office, 434 Locust ave., Long Beach, California.

Tom B. Clark Congressional Candidate Here

Tom B. Clark, for 11 years a Democratic party leader in the South Bay district, except for the period of 30 months he spent in the U. S. Navy in the South Pacific, has announced his candidacy for Congress in the 17th Congressional district.

He is the first candidate for the office to throw his hat into the congressional ring, including the incumbent, Rep. Cecil King. Clark, former minister of the Christian Church in Redondo Beach, and later chief of the crime prevention bureau under the late District Attorney Dockweiler, was chairman of the Santa Barbara Democratic County Central Committee for many years prior to moving to this district a decade ago.

His announcement of candidacy follows: "I am a candidate for Congress in the 17th Congressional District."

"I was born in America and educated in schools, colleges, and universities of America, and have been a resident of the 17th Congressional District for the past eleven years. I was honorably discharged from the Navy July 30th, 1945, after having completed thirty months active service in the Pacific. I have been a registered voting Democrat since I was twenty-one years old."

"A thorough survey made recently in the 17th Congressional District conclusively shows that we need a Congressman who will represent all of the people of the 17th District all the time, and one who will listen to and act upon the needs of the District. This I pledge myself to do."

"So that you may fully understand the above statement, let me assure you that immediately upon my election I will appoint a Field Secretary, who is a resident of and who will remain in the 17th Congressional District, and who will be personally available to you at all times. His job will be to transmit to me, while on duty in Washington, those matters which you deem need attention by your Congressman."

"After the election, I assure you that I will be an active and hardworking public servant."

C. Harold Gansereit, fireman, second class, USNR, 1315 W. 225th st., Torrance, helped evacuate 219 recovered Allied military personnel aboard the USS Biloxi from the city that was the victim of the second atom bomb, Nagasaki.

The liberated men were principally Dutch and Japanese, with only a few English and Americans.

At the railway station near the dock, American hospital ships' medical men attended stretcher cases.

The Biloxi had fought through eight invasions and numerous bombardments for this satisfying task.
