## Banning To Give Tartars First Real Test Today

Torrance high school gridders will tangle today with the Banning high school squad. The game could possibly be the key game in this year's championship struggle. Both the Tartars and the Pilots have yet to have the goal lines crossed. Banning played to a scoreless tie with Gardena, the other main contender for the 1945 championship. Torrance and Banning have overpowered both Narbonne and San Pedro in previous contests. San Pedro suffered a 7-0 defeat at the hands of the Tartars and Pilots. Banning edged the Narbonne Gauchos by a 7-0 score, but showed a great deal more power than appears from the score, being in scoring territory quite a few times. The Tartars trounced Narbonne 28-0, and lost three probable touchdowns on fumbles.

The Banning squad boasts great speed around the ends, while Torrance has one of the strongest forward walls in the league. The two Banning-Torrance encounters will probably be the leagues most exciting battles of the year.

## Deadline Set For Touch Football Entries

Saturday, Oct. 27 is the last day to enter teams in the touch football league being formed at the Torrance city park. League play must be finished by Nov. 25 to enable the winning teams to compete in the county play-ground (elimination) championships, which finish up during the Christmas vacation period.

Since the inception of touch football, many rules and types of play have been used in various parts of the United States, consequently a committee of playground directors drew up a set of rules that have been proven by experience to be most practical for playground use, and have been adopted for local play.

A brief summary of the rules is given here for the benefit of players and fans.

The game: Similar to football, except the ball carrier is touched below the belt with both hands at once, instead of being tackled. The field: 36x60 yds. divided into 3 zones, 17 1/16 yds., 25% yds., and 17 1/16 yds. with 7 yd. end zones. Players: A team consists of 7 players. Any player is eligible to throw or receive passes and any combination of players for line or backfield may be used. Play: If the offensive team fails to make next zone in 4 downs, opponents take ball at spot of the last down.

Scoring: Touchdown 6 points, safety 2 points, conversion 1 point. (In try after touchdown, the point is made by either running or passing the ball over the goal line successfully from the three yard line following a touchdown.)

Regular football rules cover all points not specified in touch football rules. Double-headers will be played on Saturday mornings and practice games can be arranged for Mondays and Wednesdays by contacting Elmer "Red" Moon, at the city recreation office at the city park.

## Track May Draw National Meet

Torrance model ace car track may be the scene of national competition in February, it was revealed by City Superintendent of Recreation Dale Riley Tuesday night when he asked the City Council to make allowances for improvement of the model race car track at Plaza del Amo and Border ave.

The council decided to spend \$500 to plant lawn in the area within the track and build a six-foot fence to protect the on-lookers. Also allowed was \$122 for installation of a new transformer.

Contreras, who has won his last five fights, four of them at the Bowl, against the best middleweight talent in Southern California, will engage Buddy Knox of the Los Angeles Main Street gym in the feature fight of an eight four-round fistic show. First bout will begin at 8:30 p.m.

The opening show will feature a 1200 lb. and was judged by officials of the State Athletic Commission as the finest opening card in recent Southern California history. Last week, there were more than 2000 in the Bowl.

Other matches on the show this week will bring out lads who have proved popular in recent weeks, although—as in all amateur shows, few bouts are arranged prior to the weigh-in except the headline event.

Among those who definitely will appear are: Charles Figueroa of San Pedro, who gained many friends even in losing last week's whirlwind main event; Angelo Chavez of the Terminal Island Naval Air Station, a middleweight with professional ideas, who wants a good rival; and two Wilmington boys, Pete Anala, a 124-pound youngster who won easily last week, and Johnny Lopez.

Another interesting factor in the Bowl boxing revival is that Craig's policy of "Ladies Free" drew more than 700 women to the fights last week.

The Torrance "Bee" grid team, which has won only one of its games this season, faces Banning today, with Coach Katz a little bit gloomy about the outcome. The Banning Bees are favored, having won all three of their games this season. They rolled over Gardena 12-0, trounced San Pedro 18-0, and last week tripped Narbonne 13-6. Banning uses a T-formation and has the necessary weight and speed to execute it well. They have a good offense and a strong defense, which is readily seen by observing their past performances. Banning has scored seven touchdowns while their opponents have entered their sacred soil but once.

On the other hand, the Tarababes have fared pretty well this season. Although losing to San Pedro 13-0 in the league opener, the Torrance lightweights ran roughshod over Narbonne two weeks ago, 19-0. Completely outplayed, the Gauchos Bees were mope putty in the hands of Coach Katz's proteges.

Bill Morgan scored the first touchdown for Torrance on an end sweep from fifteen yards out after the Tarababes had driven sixty yards in five plays, the first time they had possession of the ball early in the first quarter.

## City Basketball Leagues Planned

## Rules Told As Duck Season Approaches

The season on ducks, geese and mudhens opened in Modoc, Lassen and Siskiyou counties on Oct. 13, but the remainder of the state will not be open to waterfowl hunting until Nov. 2. Reports from the State Division of Fish and Game indicate that hunting should be good on the opening day in these three northern counties.

State and Federal migratory waterfowl regulations this season are as follows: Shooting time, one-half hour before sunrise to sunset. Bag limit on ducks, ten in the aggregate, all species (1 may be a wood duck). Possession limit, two daily limits (except on opening day, only one wood duck). Daily limit, more geese, snow and white-fronted (Specks) four singly or in the aggregate and two other geese (Honkers, Hutchins, Cacklers, Brant, etc.). Possession limit, it is two daily limits (except on opening day). Daily and possession limit on mudhens and Red Breasted Mergansers is 25. Species protected at all times are Ross Geese, all shorebirds (including Jacksnipe), Swans, Grebes, Loons, Puffins, Auklets, Murres, Gull, Terns, Shearwaters, Petrels, Brown Pelicans, Ibis, Bitterns, Herons, Egrets, Cranes and Rails.

The use of live decoys and feeding is prohibited. Shotgun larger than 10 gauge, rifles, repeaters and automatics carrying more than three shells are unlawful. Sink boxes are prohibited. It is also unlawful to shoot from a power boat, sail boat under sail, automobile or airplane. Every hunter must possess a state hunting license and those over sixteen years of age must obtain a Federal Duck Stamp. These duck stamps may be purchased at post offices.

California is the second highest ranking state in the sale of duck stamps. Last year 113,251 Federal duck stamps were sold in this state, only to be exceeded by the sale of stamps in the state of Minnesota, where the sale was 114,415.

With a single score in the first quarter, Gardena high last Thursday on their local field defeated San Pedro high 6-0 in a Marine League game by a final score indicated, because Gardena's three different occasions marched to San Pedro's goal line but lost the ball on fumbles.

Gardena's score was made by Al Carmichael around end. This victory, added to last week's tie with Banning, makes Gardena rooters hopeful of beating Narbonne next week and going to the game with Torrance in two weeks for the possible league championship.
