

New Recreation Ordinance For City Is Prepared For Early Presentation

A new recreation department ordinance providing for the appointment of five regular members and two ex-officio members will be presented to the City Council at an early meeting, it was said yesterday.

The ordinance provides that four members will be named by the mayor, one by the mayor upon nomination of the principal of the high school, and that one member of the council and the superintendent of parks shall be ex-officio members.

Terms will be for four years, with the original members drawing lots to determine staggered terms of two, three and four years.

The ordinance provides for election of a chairman, vice-chairman and secretary, and the appointment of a general manager who shall be superintendent of recreation and other assistants.

The commission "shall have power and authority to manage and conduct recreation centers and recreational activities on such grounds or in such buildings as may be placed under their jurisdiction or made available to them including the use of school facilities," the proposed ordinance reads. "They shall have power to conduct children's playgrounds, indoor

and outdoor recreational activities, and in general do any and all things necessary or proper for establishment and development of a well-rounded recreational program.

"The Recreation commission may accept all moneys appropriated for that purpose by the City Council or the schools, or from any public body and all donations, legacies or bequests from any other source." This money will be deposited in a city recreation fund expendable only by the commission for its purposes.

Mrs. George Baer's Girl Scout Troop No. 416 and A. C. Turner's Boy Scout Troop No. 241 will have charge of the contest games. Recreation Resource Of War-Winans

Recreation was considered by President Roosevelt to be a "Resource of War" and the best leaders, the finest equipment and facilities were given No. 1 priority for shipment overseas, Sterling S. Winans, recreation consultant, division of field services, California State Youth Authority, told Torrance Lions club members at their meeting Tuesday noon in the Civic Auditorium.

He said that while in World War I the recreation activities of our men in camps on domestic and foreign soil were cared for by the American Red Cross, in World War II they were provided for by commissioned and enlisted personnel of finest training, in the Army, Navy, Coast Guard, Marine Corps and auxiliary organizations.

"Recreation thus has become an essential government service," Winans said, "and your recreation planning in Torrance should be done now."

He declared that recreation and its associated activities comprise the third greatest business of California, with only agriculture and manufacturing exceeding it. Winans said that school grounds, gymnasiums and other facilities should be open and available for recreation and properly supervised at all hours of the day and evening, and declared that "leadership is the most important single item in recreation."

The speaker complimented the work done by the City Recreation department, under Dale Riley, superintendent, and said that the recent survey of recreation needs made by Major George Braden, of the National Recreation Association, should be given intense study by the Lions club and other organizations of Torrance interested in recreation.

Speaking as he was under the auspices of the California Youth Authority, Winans explained that the legislation which brought about the establishment of the Youth Authority was drafted by the American Bar Association to aid in preventing juvenile delinquency.

It was adopted in California in 1941 and put into practice and properly financed in 1943, he said.

"Delinquency should have treatment," Winans asserted. "One pattern should not be taken for every youngster, and value to health, morale and spiritual development of a juvenile offered in recreation activities is recognized as one of the outstanding benefits of a well-rounded community recreation program."

The speaker was introduced by George P. Thatcher, a member of the City Recreation commission.

Dr. Rollin I. Smith, veterinarian, first vice-president of the club, presided.
