The Golden Text of the Sunday Lesson—Sermon on "Eternalizing Punishment." In all branches of The Mother Church, The First Church of Christ, Scientist, in Boston, is from Paul and reads, "Oh let the wickedness of the wicked come to an end; but establish the just."

In his Gospel Luke relates that Jesus said unto one sick with the palsy, "Man, thy sins are forgiven thee." And the scribes and the Pharisees began to reason, saying, "Who can forgive sins, but God alone?" Jesus . . . said unto them, "What reason ye in your hearts? Whether it is easier to say, 'Thy sins be forgiven thee,' or to say, 'Rise up and walk?' But that ye may know that the Son of man hath power upon earth to forgive sins, he said unto the sick, 'Rise up, take up thy bed, and walk.' And immediately he rose up before them. . . and departed to his own house, glorifying God." "Healing the sick and reforming the sinner are one and the same thing in Christian Science," writes Mary Baker Eddy in "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures." Further she says, "Hatred, envy, dishonesty, fear, and so forth, make a man sick, and neither material medicine nor mind can help him permanently, even in body, unless it makes him better mentally, and so delivers him from his destruction."
