Characterized as a morale service, Gray Lady work includes library service in the wards, recreation and social activities. Volunteer members must also be able to keep accurate records, as well as make comprehensive referrals to the staff of requests requiring professional social service.

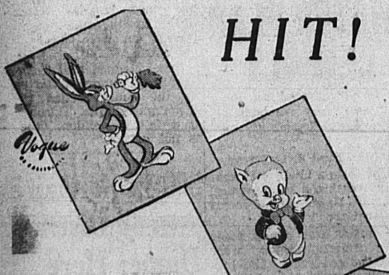
