"Slum districts," Scudder point ed out, "deteriorate the value and therefore become a con stantly smaller source of tarrevenue. Furthermore, these districts are a financial burde upon the community, as they require disproportionate spend in gof municipal funds for health sfire, and police service.

"It is generally felt among real estate people that this is a progressive measure, and every effort should be made to utilize it to the fullest extent."
