

Communications Men Needed

Complete radio communications equipment for use of the California State Guard in this area has been received, and the 2nd battalion, 39th regiment, is seeking recruits in the communications field to man a communications platoon of headquarters detachment, according to Major Harold F. Thienhaus, battalion commander.

Major Thienhaus, said that under a redesignation of radio station calls, the call letters KALG-55 have been assigned to the transmitter at the State Armory, 854 E. 7th st., Long Beach.

Walkie-Talkie equipment and other communications devices have been received for use of the State Guard, he said.

Needed are men who can qualify for officer or non-commissioned officer ratings in communications, experienced especially in short-wave, telephone, Morse code, map reading and other requirements.

Men who have had experience

in communications in the Army and Navy are especially invited to inquire about enlistment in the California State Guard, Major Thienhaus said. Information can be secured at the State Armory in Long Beach or Torrance any Monday or Thursday evening, from 7 to 10 o'clock.

Cooperation In Reaching Laymen Results From Church Group Merger

New Medical Group Associate

After serving more than two years with the 151st Medical Battalion in the Burmese jungles, saving countless lives of the American and Chinese fighters wounded while carving a roadway to the Burma Road, Capt. Eugene L. Cook is back to private practice and has associated with Dr. W. I. Laughon of the Torrance Medical Group.

Dr. Cook, a graduate of the University of Michigan and a staff surgeon there prior to his army enlistment in June of 1942, reported that he had operated in a portable hospital during the campaign in Burma and that all supplies received by his unit were flown in by Army C-47 planes due to the thick jungles and surrounding terrain.

The 151st Medical Battalion of the 20th General Hospital was an affiliated unit of the University of Pennsylvania, Dr. Cook revealed.

Returning to this country he was stationed at DeWitt General Hospital in Auburn, Calif. Following his discharge, he decided to remain in his home state and chose Torrance for his future practice.

Dr. Cook is married and recently purchased a home at 823 Madrid ave.

Christmas Clearing Bureau Forms

Establishment of a Christmas Clearing Bureau at the Torrance Service Center is being planned by a local group headed by Miss Esther Maxwell and Mrs. Edna Smith.

Registration of the names of needy families is the purpose of the Christmas Clearing Bureau. Clubs and organizations are urged to register the names of families they plan to help, to avoid duplication by some other group. Welfare agencies in the area will list the families under their care. In addition, all residents of Torrance are invited to phone in the names and addresses of needy families so that they may be remembered at Christmas. Those not cared for by some other organization will receive a Christmas dinner from the Salvation Army.

A new experiment in reaching laymen and lay women of America with information concerning a world fellowship of Christians has been arranged through cooperation of the American Council for the World Council of Churches and the International Council of Religious Education, according to Dr. Roy G. Ross, general secretary of the International Council.

"Through mutual agreement," he declared, "the Rev. Paul G. Macy, one of the American leaders in the ecumenical movement, becomes director of ecumenical education of the International Council, in addition to becoming director of the midwest region for the American Committee for the World Council."

"The Rev. Mr. Macy, whose headquarters will be at the International Council offices in Chicago, will work through the various departments and committees of the International Council, and will represent all phases of the World Council's activities in the midwest states," Dr. Ross stated.

In discussing the need of this new experiment, the Rev. Mr. Macy stressed a desperate need "that Christians in every country understand one another."

"It may be literally true that we must have a unity of Christians around the world, or we will have no world at all," he maintained. "The move toward building a strong world-wide Christian fellowship is the most important step forward taken by Christians in many centuries."

However, it is a little use unless it becomes a real and vital part of the thinking of the people of the churches. That means there must be an educational process which teaches all age groups and all departments of church life the importance of a fellowship of Christians.

The International Council of Religious Education represents 40 Protestant denominations and 183 state, city and provincial councils of churches and religious education in the United States and Canada in the field of Christian education. President of the International Council is Capt. Harold E. Stassen, U.S. Navy, James L. Kraft, Chicago, is treasurer and for serving as acting-president during the naval service of Capt. Stassen.
