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Torrance May Be Asked To Adopt Anti-Smog Model Ordinance Soon

Torrance may be asked to join other cities of Los Angeles county in adopting a "model anti-smog" ordinance, it was revealed this week.

Sharply criticizing synthetic rubber plants and other works as being offenders, Werner Ruchti, Long Beach planning director, has urged the city of Long Beach to take the lead in uniform anti-smog laws for the metropolitan area.

Ruchti asserted that the problem presented by noxious fumes in Southern California demands early solution because of additional vapor-producing industries which may desire to establish plants here.

That 83 cities in the greater metropolitan area are affected by gases from industrial districts was pointed out by the planning director.

Synthetic rubber plants, fish canneries and aluminum plants are the worst offenders, according to Ruchti, who declared the elimination of smog to be a regional matter which cannot be solved by any one municipality alone.

"Long Beach must not lag behind Los Angeles, Pasadena and other cities in respect to the study of smog and its control," said Ruchti, who urged close cooperation with those municipalities.

The Los Angeles city council's public health committee is studying the situation. The county counsel is determining whether the county supervisors can enter into contracts with cities to enforce anti-smog ordinances on the same principle that it is now allowed to enforce health measures.

A model ordinance, which would be aimed at controlling smog, is being drafted by the counsel and will be submitted on approval to Long Beach, Inglewood, Pasadena, Compton, Torrance, Signal Hill and other cities affected by the odor nuisance.

Christmas Bureau, Aid Asked Of Organizations

Gay pink and green folders went to all community organizations in Torrance this week, announcing the opening of a Christmas Clearing Bureau at Torrance Service Center. The cooperation of all welfare committees and interested individuals is solicited for the registration of the names of needy families.

The Christmas Clearing Bureau does not distribute Christmas baskets but exists simply as a means for coordinating Christmas giving. When all welfare organizations register the names of families they are helping, duplication is prevented, and welfare funds can reach farther. The confidential nature of the Christmas Clearing Bureau protects the needy family and makes possible the reaching of persons who would otherwise not be willing to let their needs be made known. The names of such families are then referred to organizations willing to remember them at Christmas. In addition to local clubs the Christmas Clearing Bureau has the active help of the Welfare Department of the Salvation Army.

All clubs and organizations are urged to make early registration so that Santa Claus may not become involved in a last minute rush.

Attempts To Commercialize Beaches Hit In Letter To County Supervisors

Public-minded citizens headed by the Shoreline Planning Association of California, Inc., today, lodged a written protest with the Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors against attempts by private interests to commercialize local beaches.

The protest was based on the premise that the beaches—one of California's largest assets—belong to the public for recreational purposes, and as such should not be exploited for private financial gain.

The letter, signed by George P. Larsen, executive secretary of the Shoreline Planning Association, charged that "private interests appear to be preparing developments of certain beach locations in Los Angeles and other counties for exclusive use."

Larsen contended that such a movement was afoot "in spite of the statewide program of acquisition, development, restoration and protection of the available beach areas, classified as recreational."

Also, he added, it was contrary to the fact that the 15 coastal counties, through their Boards of Supervisors, have adopted master plans which specify the beach areas and the special uses by the public.

Mentioned specifically was beach space adjoining 8,700-feet of beach in the Malibu area at Zuma Creek recently purchased by Los Angeles County. The privately-owned property, at Point Dume, he alleged, is to be divided and sold as lots, although this particular property was included in the master plan of acquisition.

"Tentative development plans have been mapped for its public use as soon as it can be acquired by the State and County through legislative procedure," said Larsen. "The owners must know this. Information," he added, "has reached us that similar problems exist in some of the other counties."

It was alleged too that private interests are planning development of an "exclusive and private" yacht harbor also in the Malibu area. Larsen said that this property should be left intact for development for public use.

He said that the Shoreline Planning Association is fostering plans for the location of yacht harbors and harbors of refuge in all coastal counties for general public use.
