Civilians May Aid Release Of Army Personnel

To expedite the release of hundreds of enlisted men and women now performing essential duties at Army Service Forces separation centers, an intensified campaign has been launched to replace military with civilian employees, it was announced today by Major General William E. Shedd, commanding general, Ninth Service Command, at Fort Douglas, Utah.

A survey just completed reveals that 3,771 positions are available at the four personnel centers in the Ninth Service Command. Of this number, 2,890 are graded civil service positions with pay ranging from \$1,506 to \$2,650 per year, based on a 40-hour week. The remaining 881 positions are ungraded, with hourly wage scales depending upon the work performed.

FHA Seeks To Stimulate Building Of Homes By 'Middle Market' Class

Another step in broadening FHA operations to stimulate production in the Southern California area of new houses in the middle market was announced today by John E. McGovern, director for Southern California District of the Federal Housing Administration.

In explaining the new FHA policy which is designed to provide more advantageous credit facilities to the home construction industry, McGovern said: "The FHA policy in this regard has been liberalized to meet a need for firm financial arrangements permitting a builder to plan a building program in advance, make interim construction financing easier and possibly reduce the cost of construction through planned production."

McGovern declared that FHA officials in Washington had spent several weeks in conference with leaders of the lending and building industry on the matter and that it had been generally agreed the new type of commitment, supplementing the present conditional commitment, will be helpful.

The firm commitment will constitute a dual commitment by providing that in the event the property is sold to an owner-occupant, acceptable under FHA regulations, for a longer term ratio loan, such a loan may be insured without the necessity of cost of preparing and recording a new mortgage instrument.

The Los Angeles FHA office has been authorized to start issuing firm commitments to approved lending institutions to insure 80 percent up to \$6,000 in valuation of homes produced by operating builders, and 60 percent on the value in excess of \$6,000 up to \$10,000 in valuation. The builder in all such cases would be the mortgagor.

This operation differs from the procedure followed in issuing conditional commitments, in which cases FHA agrees to insure the mortgage on a house built to its standards when the builder secures a satisfactory purchaser.

Thus with a firm commitment, a builder can more readily arrange for loans which he may need in planning long-range, large-scale operations in the middle market range price.
