• Offices In Job Find Increase

More than 287 Torrance Area workers found jobs through the facilities of the Torrance U.S.E.S., during the month of October, K. E. Bradley, manager, announced yesterday.

This is an increase of 105 or 58 percent over September's score of 182 Bradley said, and indicates that displaced war workers and returning veterans are bringing their "job shopping" to a close and accepting available peacetime jobs.

Manufacturing industries attracted the greatest number of work applicants last month, with 190 new employees being added to payrolls. Other industries and new employees included: Wholesale and Retail trade, 28; Service Workers, 18; Public Utilities 18 and Financial, 16.

For the first time since 1941, aircraft and aircraft parts dropped to fifth place among manufacturing and industries requiring new employees, Bradley said.

Vets Advised To Reenlist Early To Avoid Disappointment

Lt. H. A. Glover, San Pedro recruiting officer, today stressed the fact that due to the change in current regulations, veterans must reenlist within 20 days after date of discharge in order to retain rank held at time of discharge and to be eligible for the three months furlough. The regulation that allows up to 90 days after date of discharge to receive enlistment bonus of \$50 per year for each year of active service since last enlistment has not been changed. Lt. Glover stated that a large number of veterans have contacted his office just a few days too late to receive the benefits offered by the government and he is issuing this statement in the hope that veterans in the future will be warned of this time element involved and not be disappointed upon their application for reenlistment. "It is better to inquire now, than to be sorry later," Lt. Glover said.
