Frank "Tractor" Dominguez, Tartar line plunger, converted this season from tackle to full back when it was felt that he was needed more in the backfield, averaged more than three and one-half yards per play during the season, which is consistent ground gaining in anyone's league.

It is recalled that a famous all-American fullback of the 1927 Minnesota Gopher eleven chalked up three and one-half yards per play during his last season. Dominguez lost some playing time due to a knee injury received early in the football practice which may or may not have raised his average.

Tomorrow evening something new in the selecting of All-Marine League football players will be decided during a meeting of newsmen representing five newspapers in the Marine League district.

The football "game of the year" will be played today, at Torrance High school. The annual grid battle between the Juniors and Seniors is slated for 2 p. m. and the public is invited.

Each semester a contest is held between the Juniors and the Seniors to determine which class is the strongest. During the spring semester a Tartar Tournament is held in which there is a tug-of-war, wheelbarrow race, and a pushball contest.

Last football season the Juniors upset the Seniors 13-0, but this year's Senior team which is made up of last year's victorious Juniors is heavily favored to win. Of the eight men on their starting team seven of them have played first string all season, and the other played a great deal as a substitute.

Gerald Godard, who has made All-Marine two seasons and will undoubtedly be named this year, leads the list of talent. He will occupy the left guard position.

Dan Moon and Bill Dietlin will occupy the end positions. Both of these boys played basketball, a minor sport, last year, but nevertheless they have done very well in this "game of the year."

Their backfield consists of Don Cook, Frank Dominguez, and Gene Holloman. Frank and Gene both played last year's team, while this is Don's first year on the varsity.

On the junior team there are only three first stringers from the 1945 Torrance Varsity team, Leroy Schwenk, Ralph George, and Jack Delsigne. Leroy played end for the Tartars, and did a great deal in helping Torrance capture second place in the league.

George was one of Torrance's backfield performers.

Delsigne and J. R. Stroth will be the guards, with Eddie Fortin, another Bee player, at center. In the backfield there will be George, Gilbert Bennett and Bud Smith.

As far as the quality of individual players goes, the Seniors definitely are superior. However, the Juniors have a lot of spirit and might surprise everybody by upsetting the supposedly invincible seniors.
