### LONGREN COMPANY PAYROLL REACHES WAR-TIME PEAK AS RECONVERSION COMPLETED

Longren Aircraft Company has thoroughly "reconverted" and now is employing as many workers in its Torrance plant as it did during the war on defense contracts, turning out metal scooters at a rate of 1000 per day.

This was revealed by Chapman Wentworth, vice president in charge of production and development, who said that the company is working on ten other items on which production will start after the first of the year.

Wentworth was discharged a few weeks ago from the U. S. Navy, in which he held a commission as ensign, and resumed his work at Longren immediately. His father, Franklin Wentworth, is president and general manager of the firm, and a brother, Hampden Wentworth, now in the service, is also associated in the plant.

Surplus materials left over from cancelled airplane parts war contracts were utilized on the new scooter within two weeks. Wentworth said, and while the sales department of the company was boasting of sales of 250 of the scooters a day early in the program, production quickly jumped to more than 1000 a day.

More than 100 persons are employed at the plant now, and the payroll will jump to 150 persons within a few months, it was said.

Items to be manufactured by the plant include the all metal shopping basket, wheel barrows and other equipment and devices. Ample supplies of materials already have been contracted for, on a long range basis, it was said.

Cpl. John H. Hamman, son of Mrs. Anna Hamman, of 1425 W. 23rd St., has returned from the E.T.O. and has received his honorable discharge.

A mortar gunner, attached to an infantry unit, he participated in the Battles of the Rhineland, Ardennes and Central Europe. He also fought with the French Army in Colmar, France and in the Ruhr pocket.

He narrowly escaped death when his body, standing beside him, was killed by a sniper.

Cpl. Hamman is the holder of the Purple Heart medal and wears campaign ribbons for participation in Eastern Campaign, American Campaign, Victory, a medal for the European-African-Middle East and holds the combat expert infantryman's badge.

6 "Any time after 20 years I can retire at half pay increasing year by year to three-quarters retirement pay after 30 years of service. And the time I've already served in active military or naval service counts toward my retirement time. Added up—reenlistment seems pretty sound to me!"

JANUARY 31, 1946

AN IMPORTANT DATE FOR MEN IN THE ARMY

MEN now in Army who reenlist before February 1 will be reenlisted in present grade. Men honorably discharged can reenlist within 20 days after discharge in grade held at time of discharge, provided they reenlist before February 1, 1946.

You may enlist AT ANY TIME for 1½, 2 or 3 year periods. (One-year enlistments for men now in the Army with at least 6 months of service.)

### PAY PER MONTH— ENLISTED MEN

In Addition to Food, Lodging, Clothes and Medical Care

(a)—Plus 20% Increase for Service Overseas. (b)—Plus 50% if Member of Flying Crews, Parachutist, etc. (c)—Plus 5% Increase in Pay for Each 3 Years of Service.

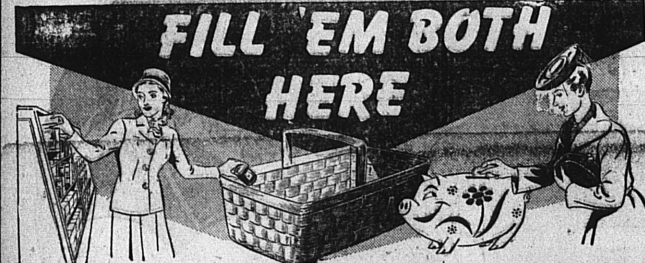
