

## Six Torrance Men Attending State CIO Council Parley In San Francisco

Six Torrance men are in San Francisco attending the 8th annual convention of the California CIO Council which opened yesterday.

Heading the Torrance group are Kenneth Beight, vice president of the California CIO Council and president of the Los Angeles Industrial Council, and Alex McJannett, president of Local Union 1414, United Steelworkers of America. Beight is delegate of the Los Angeles Industrial Council as well as attending in his capacity as vice president of the California Council.

Others attending from Local 1414 are J. J. Gallyer, vice president; Wayne Sidwell, recording secretary; Walter Smith, financial secretary, and Fred Robinson, chairman of the grievance committee.

The convention will last several days.

"Jobs for All" is the keynote of the convention. Emphasis will be laid on increased political action through political action committees in local unions and on organization of employees not now in AFL or CIO.

Speakers will include Col. Evans Carlson, United States Marine Corps, leader of "Carlson's Raiders"; Sidney Hillman, chairman of CIO's national political action committee; and Harry Bridges, California CIO division and president of the International Longshoremen's and Warehousemen's Union.

A broad program aimed at state development and speedy reversion of industry for peace, will be projected at the convention, it was said.

Issues before the convention will include action in behalf of the Central Valley project as outlined by the Bureau of Reclamation, according to material released to affiliated unions by Mervyn Rathbone, state secretary, and James G. Thimmes, president.

Creation of a state Reconstruction Finance Corporation, with a capitalization of at least \$500 millions is projected, to assist private enterprise, particularly small business, to convert plants for peacetime production, to create new industries, and to assist in the financing of the Urban Redevelopment Law adopted by last session of the Legislature.

A state department of commerce and development to aid business and agriculture in solution of marketing, product development, technological and research problems, is called for.

Appropriate action by the governor and the legislature to obtain a Pacific Coast office of the Office of War Mobilization and Reconversion, will be up for discussion by convention delegates.

Issues of general interest which may occupy convention time will be candidates in the 1946 elections, support to the CIO Food and Tobacco Workers'.

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## Need For More Bond Buying Told By Nurse

How the funds being raised by the sale of Victory Bonds is needed to provide for casualties and pay other war costs incident to the welfare of the veterans was explained to Torrance Lions club Tuesday noon by 1st

Lt. Doris A. Murphy, ANC, who has seen many years of service both at home and abroad during the war.

The real burden is just beginning, she said, as the long-range veterans' rehabilitation program is being undertaken. Meanwhile, thousands of wounded men still remain in hospitals overseas who must not be forgotten, she declared.

campaign in Torrance to put the Victory Bond drive over the top.

Another speaker, Stan Rouso, of the public information department of Calverts Distillers Corp., told an interesting story of the major position occupied by the alcoholic beverage industry in its relation to other major industries in this country. He pointed out how the industry has helped our government during the wartime period. He told of the tremendous amount of taxes paid on

alcoholic beverages—one billion, 900 million dollars during the past year alone, with over 13 billion dollars in taxes paid during the past 11 years since repeal.
