

Christmas Seal Sales Important To All Citizens

"The success or failure of the annual Christmas Seal sale is of vital importance to every citizen in our community," Dr. Leland Hawkins, president of the Los Angeles County Tuberculosis and Health Association stated in commenting on the slowness with which Christmas Seal returns are being made at the Association's office at 117 W. Ninth st.

Funds received through the annual sale of Christmas Seals, Hawkins pointed out, are used on a year 'round program which includes free chest x-rays for workers in business and industrial plants and establishments, for tuberculosis testing in schools, and in educating the general public on the causes and prevention of the disease, through the use of films, pamphlets, recordings, etc.

"Returns are not coming in as they should," he said, "and unless there is decided increase during the next two weeks our fight against tuberculosis during the coming year will have to be seriously curtailed. We cannot afford to let this happen. I urge everyone who has not done so to purchase Christmas Seals and use them."

Booths and self sellers have been placed in 58 towns throughout the county to assist those who did not get Seals in the mail to get them in person. Seals may also be obtained through the Association's office at 117 W. Ninth st. or by calling TRINITY 0381.

Sugar Stamp 39 Good Jan. 1

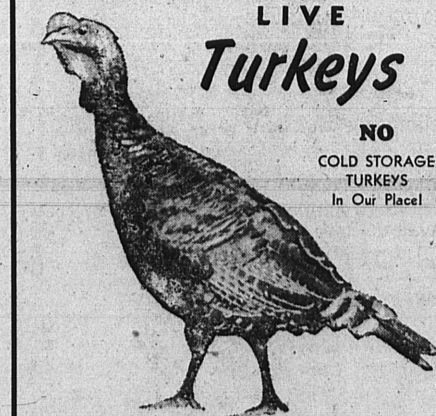

Propose Use Of Health Centers For Hospitals

County supervisors adopted a motion by Supervisor Leonard J. Roach ordering the county health officer to explore the possibilities of using County Health Centers in Torrance and elsewhere for emergency hospitals.

The plan contemplates leasing quarters in the health centers to private physicians or hospitals. The supervisor said that since these centers are located strategically throughout the county, this new plan should greatly alleviate the suffering caused by long waits following automobile accidents. The procedure would involve no expense to taxpayers.

Welfare Council Cooperates In Drive To Supply Christmas Gifts To Needy

The Welfare Council of Metropolitan Los Angeles is cooperating with other social agencies throughout the city and with the city Social Service Bureau in their annual attempt to supply Christmas gifts and services to families, children in homes, club groups and institutions.

All requests for, and offers of, aid will be cleared through the Christmas Clearing Bureau, maintained annually by the Social Service Department to avoid duplication of gifts.

Leaders in charge of the plan have released lists of gifts and services suitable, as well as names of agencies which are co-operating by serving as information centers.

According to the list, families most appreciate plans such as gifts orders or checks so that they may have the pleasure of choosing gifts to be given their children. The Bureau also recommends that families be kept together at Christmas, rather than separated by invitations.
