

Presbyterians Plan To Welcome Moderator Due On January Tour

Presbyterians throughout this area are now laying elaborate plans to welcome their national moderator, Dr. William B. Lampe, of St. Louis, Missouri, who is now on a nationwide tour of the church as made annually by the head of that denomination.

Dr. Lampe, minister of the West Presbyterian church of St. Louis, is expected to arrive in the Southland this Friday (Jan. 4) for a five day series of special meetings which are being arranged in his honor, in key Southern California communities.

Calories Discussed By Dr. Swartout

H. O. Swartout, M.D., Dr. P.H. L. County Health Officer. The holiday season is a time when it is customary to eat heartily and to include more than the ordinary proportion of rich foods in the diet. But it is as important now as ever to "watch your calories."

The calorie is a measure of heat. Starch, sugar, oil and fat are chiefly used in the body to produce heat, and if taken in greater quantities than needed to keep up the body heat the excess goes to form useless and even harmful fat.

Don't forget the "basic seven." First, eat one serving of fruit daily, preferably citrus fruit or tomatoes. Second, eat at least two servings of vegetables daily, one of them being a dark green leafy vegetable, and one of them a yellow vegetable. Third, give each child a quart of milk and each adult a pint of milk daily. Fourth, eat one egg a day. Fifth, eat one serving of meat, fish or poultry daily, or substitutes rich in protein. Sixth, eat cereal or bread at each meal—whole grain cereal or whole wheat bread preferably. Seventh, eat a little butter or vitamin A fortified margarine at each meal.

If your work is heavy and your appetite is not yet satisfied, eat more food, chiefly cereals, potatoes, and sweet or starchy vegetables. Watch your weight. If you are losing, eat more of these extra foods. If you are gaining, eat less of them.

General Petroleum Management Report To Employees Released

S. J. Dickey, president of General Petroleum Corporation, has just set a precedent in big-business technique by releasing to public consumption a management's report to its employees. Dickey thereby gave full recognition to the vastly increased interest the public is manifesting in management-labor relationships.

In the report Dickey announced that additional increases in pay have just been established by his company in conjunction with the return to a normal 40-hour week.

He also announced that the company was furnishing employment to 30 per cent more people than at the start of the war and that all returning servicemen and women are being taken back in their old, or better jobs where possible.

Dickey said the company had recognized changing economic conditions during the war and had increased rates of pay. This was done despite the fact, he pointed out, that the company had operated on a close margin of profit, evidenced in one instance, he cited, where a new \$15,000,000 capital investment in one major refinery addition had yielded only 2.6 per cent profit per year.

The oil executive lauded employee achievements during the war and called attention to the many ways in which the company gives full recognition to such achievements. General's employees, he said, are enjoying the benefits of pensions, insurance, vacations, holidays, sick pay and other items for which company payments amount to approximately \$2,500,000 per year in addition to those benefits required by law, such as Social Security Taxes and Workman's Compensation Insurance.

He called particular attention to family protection under General's Survivorship Benefit Plan for employees serving 20 years or more. Dickey declared: "The interests of employees and stock-

holders in the success of the company are identical. The increase in cost of materials and wages, and the present limitations on price adjustments for products call for renewed intelligent exertion and effort on the part of every individual.

"The company has more invested in more oil, more refineries and more products to sell than ever before, thus assuring continuing employment," he concluded.

Privates Can Make PFC Quick, Providing,

Men honorably discharged from the Army as privates, who reenlist within 20 days, automatically become privates first class, with \$4 more in the pay envelope each month, the Army Recruiting Office announced yesterday, providing such reenlistments are made prior to next Feb. 1.

The War Department regulation providing for reenlistment of noncommissioned officers at the grade held at time of discharge—if the reenlistment is made within 20 days—also will expire on Feb. 1, Lt. Col. John L. Althouse, area commander, pointed out.

The new inducements are expected to stimulate the campaign for voluntary enlistment of 70,000 men in this area before July 1, Lt. Col. Althouse said, adding that the drive now is ahead of schedule.

The opportunity to learn a trade or to gain a higher academic education through the Army's virtually cost-free correspondence courses, as well as the financial security offered, were the inducements cited by Col. Althouse as leading to the higher number of enlistments.



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
