



Summary Of 1945 Police **Activities Are Revealed** A general round-up of the Tor-ance Pollee department's activi-les during the past year indi-ate an upward swing in ar-cests and citations as compared to the previous year with de-reases shown in the more seri-us category of crime.



1945, police records reveal, which is responsible for the general rise. Accidents, in 1945 were report-ed below 1944 as were injuries sustained from these accidents. It was pointed out by the de-partment that although the to-tal number of injuries had taken a drop, they were of a more serious nature with death re-suiting in four of the cases. Automobiles stolen, numbered 50 as compared to 68 recovered. Drunks arrested in the city during the past year totaled 503, a decrease of 33 under the previous year. Disturbing the peace tools a broad jump above 1944 with a total of 39 arrests being made. Burglaries and robberies were also listed down from 1944, as was many other felony crimes. City merchants were said to have been more careless in 1945 than any year previous. A total of 76 doors were found open by Torrance police marking the year as an alt time high.
