The planes, to be piloted by former Naval Air Transport Service flyers will make the trip between the two cities in two hours and five minutes.

Two-Family Suit This Time Goes To The Schatzs

Mr. and Mrs. Walter Welpe, 2300 W. 235th st., who were acquitted by a jury in City Judge John Shidler's court last November on disturbing the peace and battery charges brought by Mr. and Mrs. A. Schatz, also of that address, failed to fare so well in Long Beach municipal court it was learned where they were ordered to pay \$50 damages to the Schatzs.

Mrs. Schatz, at the original hearing, charged Mrs. Welpe with inflicting injuries upon her during a two-family argument and that Walter Welpe had encouraged his wife to attack her further.

Following their acquittal, the Welpe sued Schatz's for malicious prosecution, asking \$2450 damages. Shidler, the judge in the original case, defended the Schatzs' upon the latter charge before a Long Beach judge and countered with a cross complaint.

The two families continue to occupy homes upon the same property.

Proper Guidance For Vets, Others In Small Business Loans Asked

Proper guidance for veterans and others starting small businesses is an important responsibility of both bankers and the federal government, Walter E. Elleson, assistance district manager in charge of the Los Angeles office of the U. S. Department of Commerce, last night told the monthly dinner meeting of the Independent Bankers Association of Southern California. Membership in the Association is held by the Torrance National Bank and 65 other community banks in Southern California with total resources of over \$1,150,000,000.

"During 1944, a year of general business prosperity, one out of every six newly opened businesses closed its doors within the 12 months," Mr. Elleson said. "This was at more than double the rate of failures for all firms. An analysis of the reasons for these failures indicated that the principal cause was the inexperience of the individuals entering business."

"With thousands of returning veterans planning to use the loan provisions of the G. I. Bill to establish themselves in business, the need for a better guidance is greatly emphasized. The primary responsibility lies with bankers to whom the veteran comes to negotiate the G. I. loan. The Department of Commerce, however, stands ready and willing to assist in every way possible in this important responsibility. Our studies indicate some businesses are relatively safe; in others, the mortality rate is high. Some businesses require a greater amount of preparatory experience. Studies which the Department has prepared are available both to individuals planning to enter business and to banks, and afford,

\$500 Fine And 90 Days Result Of Petty Theft

City Judge John Shidler lowered the boom on shop lifting in Torrance last Thursday in City Court when he assessed a fine of \$500 and 90 days in the county jail for a \$143 theft.

Mrs. Sylvia Fink, 1231 El Prado, who pleaded not guilty to the theft of a carton of cigarettes and a 10-cent magazine from the McCown Drug Co. here Feb. 8 and asked for a jury trial, waived the jury Thursday and entered a plea of guilty.

Shidler gave in detail as to why he was lowering the sentence stating: "There are various reasons why a person takes things not belonging to him, but in this case indigent need is not one of these reasons and the court feels you should be sentenced according to the intent."

He suspended \$400 and the 90 days jail sentence with the provision that Mrs. Fink would not be found guilty of similar acts in the city of Torrance within the next six months. The fine was paid.

Vets Training At Inglewood Is Approved

Inglewood Adult Education Center having been approved by the Veterans' Administration for apprentice and veteran training, is offering evening vocational and trade extension classes that can supplement their daily employment or act as a refresher course.

R. K. Loyde, director of adult education, is anxious to assist the veteran by establishing classes in any vocational field where additional training will qualify him for a new job or assist him on his present one.

A new class, open for enrollment, will start March 4 in refrigeration and air conditioning. New classes are being organized as fast as enough applications are received to justify starting a class.

Proposed classes include architectural drafting, painting and interior decorating for journeymen, painters and apprentices. Fumigation Is Topic Of Dr. Swartout

Houses are still occasionally fumigated, but not for the same reason that used to call for such treatment. Long and careful study has proved that the gases or fumes used for fumigation are not very effective in killing the germs and viruses which cause disease.

It has been found that washing contaminated furniture, floors and walls with soapuds, then drying and airing for a day or two—sunning if possible—is much more effective than fumigation. Clothing that can be washed should be washed and hung out for a few hours in the sunlight. Upholstered furniture, window drapes and bedding need to be put in a dry, sunny place for a somewhat longer time; but they do not need fumigation.

Fumigation, however, is useful in killing insects, rats and mice in a house. The germs of some diseases, typhus fever for example, are carried by lice or fleas and the fleas most often are rat fleas. Bedbugs do not carry many diseases but they are a pest in themselves.

The gases or fumes used in fumigation are poisonous to human beings and if fumigation is to be done at all it should be done by people who have both suitable apparatus and experience in using it. Licensed fumigators should be called to do such work whenever there is a real need to have it done.

DEPENDABLE INTER-COMMUNITY TRANSPORTATION

What All Drivers Should Know

Prepared By The Department of Motor Vehicles

Directions: These questions are official and the same you are asked when you apply for your driver's license. Test your knowledge by marking yes or no in the space at the end of the line. Correct answers printed below.

1. If you have an accident while you pull out from a parking place at the curb, will it probably be your fault?
2. Can you legally sound your horn to call friends out of the house?
3. At a blind corner where you cannot see clearly into the cross street before you reach it, is the speed limit 15 miles per hour?
4. May you finish a right turn in the center lane if there is no traffic in that lane?
5. May you pass a car on the right by driving on the shoulder or unpaved part of the highway?
6. On a three-lane highway (three lanes only from curb to curb) may you drive in the middle lane any time no one else is using it?

Answers
1. Yes. Because the law provides that "no person shall start a vehicle stopped, standing or parked on a highway—unless and until such movement can be made with reasonable safety." (Section 543, Vehicle Code)
2. No. "The driver of a motor vehicle when reasonably necessary to insure safe operation shall give audible warning with his horn. Such horn shall not otherwise be used." (Section 671 (b) Vehicle Code)
3. Yes. Except on a through highway or at a traffic-control intersection. (Section 511-a-4 Vehicle Code)
4. No. The law provides that "Both the approach for a right turn and a right turn shall be made from that portion of the roadway as close as practicable to the right-hand curb or edge of the highway." (Section 540 (a) Vehicle Code)
5. No. The driver of a motor vehicle may overtake and pass another vehicle upon the right only under conditions permitting such movement in safety, and in no event shall he pass by driving upon the shoulder of the highway." (Section 629 (b) Vehicle Code)
6. No. The middle lane may be used only for passing or in preparation for a left turn. (Section 526 (b) Vehicle Code)
