Dr. Hardy, who has traveled widely in Latin American countries, uttered a warning concerning the "good neighbor" policy adopted under the administration of former President F. D. Roosevelt. Under this policy, any Central or South American country could decide to become a subject of any European or other world power, and we have agreed not to intercede. In this respect, the "good neighbor" policy differs from the "big stick" policy advocated by former President Theodore Roosevelt, under which the United States was committed to resist any encroachment of powers outside the Americas, Dr. Hardy explained.
