Langdon said veterans are compensated for any month in which their net profit is less than \$100 by receiving a cheek for the difference between net profit and \$100. To receive this compensation, Langdon said, the veteran must keep a simple financial record of income and expenses, which must be presented when his claim is filed.

Meanwhile, James G. Bryant, chairman of the California Employment Stabilization Commission, which administers payment of veterans' readjustment allowances in California through of fices of the Department of Employment, said approximately 105,000 unemployed veterans received more than \$9,000,000 in readjustment allowance chiecks during April of this year, which was about a third of the total amount of unemployment.
