Black Widow Spider Advised

Some sprays have been effective in controlling the Bla widow spider, although the adult female is extremely diffiadult female is extremely diffi-cult to kill with any contact spray. Most of the sprays tem-porarily paralyze the spider; but normal activity returns after several hours. "Playing pos-sum" or the practice of feign-ing death, an instinctive ruse of all spiders in the presence of chemicals or when disturbed, may mislead one into thinking

Carbon tetrachloride, lethane, or a to percent solution of rotenone and ethylene dichloride, are generally effective in paralyzing the spider. Kerosene applied as a spray will kill the spider in a few minutes, but the increased fire hazard must be considered in the considered in the spider will derect the spider will usually die, as is true with a creosote spray. Creosote also acts as a repellent. In rare instances it may be necessary to use a power spray of live steam through a hose.
