Additional Blast Furnace At Geneva

The effective postwar operation of the Geneva Steel Plant, recently purchased from the government by the United States Steel Corporation, came closer to realization with the blowing in of an additional blast furnace at this large Utah plant, Irving S. Olds, chairman of the board of directors of U. S. Steel Corporation, announced.

Placing this blast furnace in operation is a part of U. S. Steel's program to get the Geneva plant back into the production of steel products as promptly as possible so as to aid in supplying the heavy demands for steel in the Far West. For the time being, the plant at Geneva, Utah, will be operated by Geneva Steel Company, the same subsidiary of United States Steel Corporation which operated the plant for the government during the war. A strenuous effort is now being made by Geneva quickly to reassemble a competent operating organization. Steel making at Geneva Steel plant is scheduled to be resumed on July 22, when a portion of the open hearth department will be brought into production. This will enable the slabbing mill to begin producing formed steel so as to permit the finishing mills to turn out some finished steel products, commencing sometime in August, Olds stated.

"For many years U. S. Steel, through the integrated operations of Columbia Steel Company, its West Coast subsidiary, and the production of its other companies, has tried to keep pace with the growing steel demands in the West. When the Geneva mill has been equipped for peacetime uses, which will be done as rapidly as existing conditions permit, we hope to be able to improve that service to customers in this fast-growing section of America.

"U. S. Steel is most appreciative of the enthusiastic welcome accorded to it generally by the people in the west on its recent acquisition of the Geneva plant. We are also very grateful for the unsolicited support which countless individuals, newspapers and organizations throughout the Far West previously gave to our bid for the purchase of this plant, especially as their backing of our proposal was evidence of their conviction that it would be in the public interest to have this plant owned and operated by us. We cherish the faith so expressed in U. S. Steel.
