be located within easy reach. Otherwise, Torrance would be paying junior college tax without a college available for the students to attend.

Under the present plans, as outlined by the county superintendent of schools' office, the election of the first Torrance Board of Education will be held on March 18.

The Board of Education would immediately organize, select a superintendent of schools and then with the cooperation of the county superintendent would select the teachers for the elementary schools of Torrance. This must be accomplished by May 10.

The next big step for the new Board of Education will be the preparation and adoption of the school budget and fixing of the tax rate. This must be done by June 1.

Present members of the Torrance Charter Committee are being urged to stand for election to the Board of Education. They are: Howard A. Wood, M. D., chairman, and a former school board member in Banning, Calif.; James L. Lynch, vice chairman, Mrs. Mina Shidler, Carl Steele and Mrs. Mark Wright, a former school teacher. Also being urged to make the race are Mrs. Evelyn Carr, president of the Torrance Parents Association, and Gordon Mann, president of the Perry school district board of trustees.

The candidates for the Board of Education are nominated by parents with children in schools, and the candidates must file notice of acceptance. The five candidates receiving the highest number of votes win the election, but since the whole campaign for formation of the Torrance school district has been carried out in complete community harmony except for the opposition of the Los Angeles city school interests, it is anticipated that only five candidates will seek the office.

Dr. Carpenter said that several educators and administrators of note in California schools have indicated their interest in the position of superintendent of schools in Torrance. The candidates for the position probably will be screened by a committee appointed by the County Board of Education before the appointment is made by the Torrance Board of Education. Steps will be taken at the proper time, it was said, to protect the interest of Torrance taxpayers in the school equipment and bungalows now on Torrance school grounds, including desks, teaching equipment and other supplies. The office of the county counsel has said that Torrance is responsible for bonded indebtedness to Los Angeles city schools only in proportion to the amount of bond money actual spent in Torrance schools. An accounting will be demanded to fix this amount, and in the interim steps will be accomplished to insure that no equipment is removed until the agreement on bonded indebtedness is reached, under present plans.
