ORDINANCE NO. 380 AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF TORRANCE AMENDING ORDINANCE NO. 379

The City Council of the City of Torrance does ordain as follows:

SECTION 1. That sub-paragraph 4 of Section 3 of Ordinance No. 379 be amended by striking therefrom the date December 1, 1947, which contains a typographical error, 1947, and inserting therein the date December 1, 1946, which was and is the date intended by the City Council of the City of Torrance.

SECTION 2. This Ordinance is passed as an emergency ordinance to correct a typographical error in order that the Sales Tax Ordinance may be effective December 1, 1946, as intended by said Council.

This ordinance is urgently required for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health and safety of the City of Torrance and shall be in effect immediately after its passage. The following is a specific statement showing the urgency of this ordinance:

For the reason that December 1, 1947 was, in error, inserted in sub-paragraph 4 of Section 3 of Ordinance No. 379 and it is necessary that this typographical error be corrected in order that said Ordinance No. 379 may become operative on December 1, 1946, as intended by the City Council of the City of Torrance.

SECTION 3. The City Clerk shall certify to the adoption of this emergency ordinance and shall cause the same to be published once in the Torrance Herald, a weekly newspaper printed and published in the City of Torrance, and immediately upon its adoption the same shall be in full force and effect.

American Radiator To Build Pottery Torrance Site

It will greatly increase production facilities of American Standard, already the world's largest manufacturer of vitreous china plumbing fixtures.

The corporation at present has four large potteries, one at Richmond, California, and others at Kokomo, Indiana, Tiffin, Ohio, and Trenton, New Jersey, as well as many other plants engaged in the manufacture of enameled cast iron plumbing fixtures, brass fittings, boilers, radiators, warm air furnaces, winter air conditioners and water heaters.

The Torrance plant will incorporate the most modern features of factory design, and will be equipped throughout with the latest and most efficient equipment for the production of vitreous china plumbing fixtures.

The plant will occupy a 47.64 acre plot extending from Crenshaw blvd., between the Pacific Electric shops and 203rd st., easterly to the property line of the American Rock Wool Co. The building will be 600 feet by 1320 feet in size, and will be a show place, it is said.

An electric sign costing \$75,000 will be installed, it is reported, and an extensive beautification program is planned for the grounds surrounding the factory.

Henry Kreeger, plant manager at Richmond, will manage the Torrance plant. Praek and Praek, architects of Pittsburgh, Pa., are engineers on the project.

United States Maritime Commission surplus property now occupying the site has been ordered removed, it was reported, to make way for the new construction.

The American Radiator plant is the second new factory to decide to locate in Torrance in recent weeks, the other being Bates Expanded Steel Corp., which will occupy a 16-acre site

also purchased from the Pacific Electric Co. and adjoining the general shops of the P. E. Both plants will be served by the Pacific Electric lines.

Both transactions were handled through the Torrance Chamber of Commerce, with Blaine Walker, executive secretary, figuring principally in the deals.

It was pointed out that coming to Torrance of the two factories will employ upwards of 1,000 men, adds new emphasis on the need for immediate construction of at least 2,000 homes in Torrance.

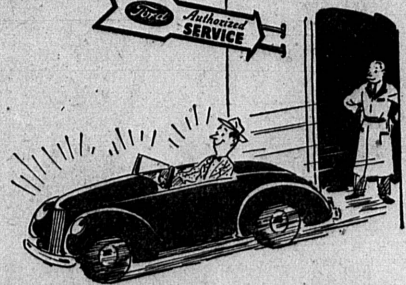
