Trucking Rates From Utah Cut

General Manager Harold W. Wright of the Los Angeles Chamber of Commerce said yesterday the Interstate Commerce Commission approved reduction of trucking rates for iron and steel shipped from Utah to Los Angeles to 40 cents per hundred pounds, overriding an eastern steel producer's objections.

Wright explained the Inland Steel Company of Chicago asked the ICC to suspend the rate for truckers. The Los Angeles Chamber, the Western States Council and other trade associations pointed out Inland Steel neither sells steel in the west nor maintains offices in Los Angeles or San Francisco.

The 40-cent rate covers minimum shipment of 35,000 pounds from Geneva, Ogden, Provo and Salt Lake City, Utah, to Los Angeles and San Francisco.

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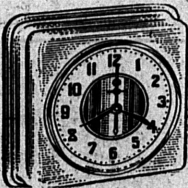

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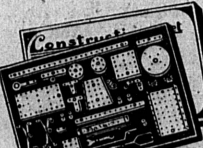


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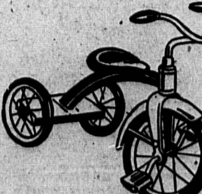
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
