Restraining Order Stops School Deals

Fritchard lawsuit, at the request of the Citizens Committee.

The hearing on March 19 will determine the Superior court's interpretation of the section of the Education code which declares that "when any territory withdrawn from a school district pursuant to this code contains a school building... said building... together with the fixtures thereof, shall, upon the withdrawal of the territory becoming effective, become the property of the district of which the territory becomes part or the whole."

Since several issues are involved in the decision, principally that of what constitutes a school building and fixtures and the effective date of the new district, it is expected that the case will be carried to the higher courts for final adjudication.

The Torrance Citizens Committee, pointing out that some \$500,000 worth of property is at stake, declared that they will seek to preserve their claimed rights in the higher courts should an adverse decision be rendered in the lower court. It is reported that this also is the Los Angeles school board's intention.

When Torrance Board of Education is elected on March 18, it is expected that that official body will then be associated in the suit, since the "taxpayers" action was filed because of the absence of such an official body.

Real estate involved in the lawsuit includes the 15-acre Gardena high school farm, located within the confines of the Torrance City school district, and the Fern avenue park property which Los Angeles had been in the process of selling to the City of Torrance.

Student body funds, athletic equipment purchased with student funds, gifts to the schools by class groups and Parent-Teacher associations also will be involved.
Ultimately, it is expected, the suit will result in adjudication of the inmate indebtedness of the Los Angeles school district to be assumed by the people of Torrance. It has been reported by legal authorities that Torrance is responsible only for the amount of money actually spent in Torrance.

Various citizens expressed elation when informed of the progress made in protecting the taxpayers' rights through the lawsuit.
"That is good news," said Fay L. Paris, chairman of the Citizens Committee which provided the funds to retain Attorney Fritchard. "Now we can be assured that the interests of Torrance will be preserved."
Dr. Howard A. Wood, Charter Committee and candidate for the Board of Education on March 18, said: "The children of Torrance are entitled to the benefits of the money which has been expended on the Torrance schools throughout the years, and now we feel that we have the means to protect these interests."

James L. Lynch, vice chairman of the Charter group and also a Board of Education candidate, commended the move of the Citizens Committee in prosecuting the lawsuit. "This is a question of equity," Lynch said, "in which the people of Torrance have much at stake. The decision of the courts in this matter will have a bearing on similar cases in years to come."

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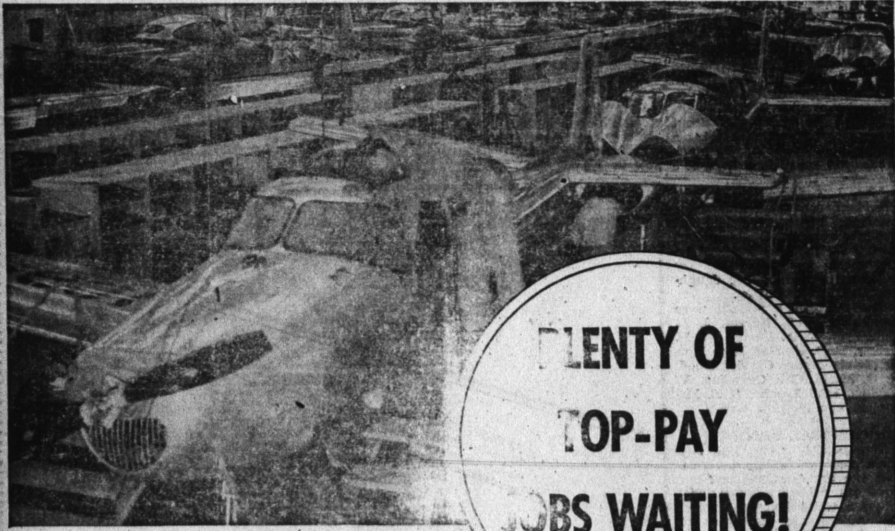
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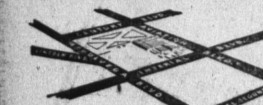
