Human Nature Responsible For Accidents

Failure of human nature is responsible for most traffic accidents, Municipal Judge Irvin Taplin told Torrance Lions club members Tuesday, at Allen's Judge Taplin declared that the country needs more than any thing the adherence to the Golden Rule, on the highway. He said that old cars do not cause as many accidents as new cars, but that if the motorist would remember to "do unto others as they would be done by," accident rates would fall.

The judge, introduced by Albert Isen, local attorney who presided over the meeting, said that the "hot rod" car problem among youths is one for the parents. He said that many parents express lack of knowledge of the activities of their sons when confronted with the evidence that they possess and drive "hot rods." The judge declared that one youth had installed a Cadillac V-8 motor on a model "A" Ford frame without knowledge of his parents, before being cited for reckless driving.

Also attending the meeting were City Judge John A. Shidler and City Attorney Otto B. Willett.

High Salaries For Schools Of City Asked

"I believe that the new Torrance school district should pay the highest salaries for the most qualified personnel," George P. Thatcher declared yesterday in support of his candidacy for the Torrance Board of Education.

Thatcher declared that the facilities of the schools of Torrance should be made available for widespread community use, for the cultural advancement of the city.

He also advocates the vocational, industrial and scientific training of students of the high school to prepare them to assume positions in the community.

Foreman—Not less than 175 cents per hour or more than a journeyman's rate for the craft involved. Above rates are for 8-hour day, 40 hours per week.

Positions not listed above will be allocated in accordance with the most recent wage scales, as reported by the Associated General Contractors, for the particular area and crafts involved.

The minimum wage paid to all skilled labor for which rates are not shown above, shall be not less than \$1.75 per hour.

The minimum wage paid to all unskilled labor for which rates are not shown above, shall be not less than \$1.15 per hour.

Overtime—one-half (1/2) times the above rates.

Sundays and holidays (except watchman) shall be at one and one-half (1 1/2) times the above rates.

Contractor and subcontractor to pay not less than the rates above set forth for the particular area and crafts involved.

Promotion Of Major Lewellen Is Announced

Promotion of Major Robert L. Lewellen Sr. and his assignment as assistant executive officer of the 578 Engineers Combat Battalion, 40th Division, California National Guard, was announced this week by Lt. Col. Davis W. Campbell, commanding officer of the battalion which has its headquarters in Torrance.

Major Lewellen has been assisting in the organization of the National Guard battalion here in his assignment as captain of Company H, 2nd Battalion, 39th Regiment, California State Guard. This unit will be inactivated March 31, and all officers and men transferred to the California National Guard reserves.

Major Lewellen was one of the organizers of the State Guard unit here and has been its commanding officer for nearly four years. He was on active duty with the State Guard for 14 months, early in the war.

The 578th Engineers Combat Battalion will be mustered in later this month and activated with federal recognition on April 1, it was revealed. Re-entraining is being conducted Tuesday and Thursday nights in the armory at Torrance Ball park.

The Battalion headquarters probably will move to buildings on the Army-developed Lomita flight strip as soon as it becomes Torrance Municipal airport on March 19.

Major Lewellen is superintendent of the mechanical department at the Torrance Herald.
