## Girl Scouts Mark 35th Anniversary

Thirty-five years ago this week Juliette Low started the first Girl Scout troop in America. The organization now has more than a million girls registered. Mrs. Grace Wright, neighborhood president, states: "Torrance is an example of this growth. A few years ago we had one troop now we have ten troops composed of about 250 girls and 70 registered adults." She continued: "Six troops are sponsored by churches, three by P. T. A. associations, and one by a club."

The Christian church sponsors two troops, Brownie Scout Troop No. 406, led by Mrs. Mavis Cook and Mrs. Edna Nolan and an intermediate Scout Troop No. 184, led by Gladys Pletzshke, Mrs. Edward Moffat and Mrs. Gertrude Harris.

St. Andrews Episcopal church sponsored Troop No. 416 has as its leaders Mrs. Mary Baer, Mrs. Alicia St. Martin and Mrs. Lavonna Williamson.

The Catholic church sponsors Torrance's largest troop, No. 610, under the leadership of Mrs. Rose Jones, assisted by Mrs. Millicent Dodd, Mrs. Jackie Hageman and Mrs. Joan Donald.

The Central church sponsors the Junior high troop, No. 472, led by Mrs. Helen McWald, Mrs. Gwynne Campbell and Mrs. Mary McDonald. Mrs. Irma Morris is the leader of the older patrol which holds evening meetings.

The Methodist church sponsors one of the two new troops—so new it hasn't a number. This troop is led by Mrs. Willow Benner and Mrs. Mildred Hazelwood.

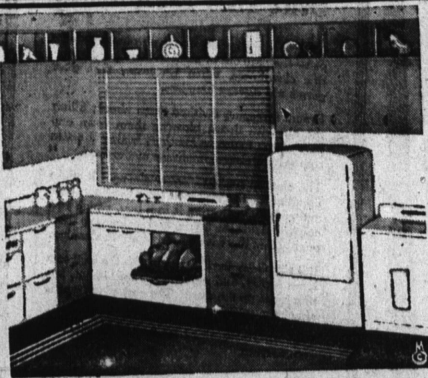
