OILERS SLATE GAMES WITH IDAHO FALLS

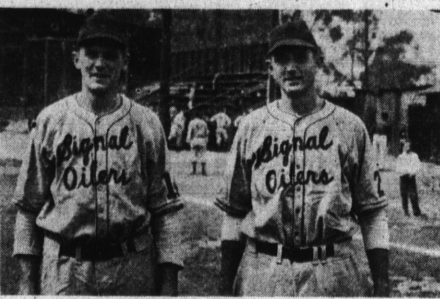

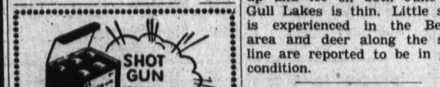

Bob Kelly Signed For L. A. Dons

Harry Thayer, general manager, announced today that the Los Angeles Dons have signed Bob Kelly, Notre Dame and Navy all-American.

The addition of Kelly is considered by Head Coach Dud DeGroot as one of the most important acquisitions the Dons have made to date.

The 21-year-old all-American, a product of Chicago's high schools, starred at right halfback for Notre Dame in 1943 and '44, received his all-American honors at the conclusion of the latter season, earning the National Academy in 1945.

Kelly is a youngster by professional standards, being 21 years old. He stands five feet ten, weighs 188 pounds.
