

CHRIST AND THE PILGRIMS OF EMMAUS, by Velazquez Diego Rodriguez de Silva y Velazquez was bom in 1599 and died in 1660. He spent the early part of his life in Seville, Spain, where he studied art and where he was married. There he painted scenes of lowly people and still life. In 1622 he visited Madrid and the following year was taken into the service of Philip IV, for whom he worked throughout the rest of his life. He visited Italy in 1629 and was there again from 1649 to 1651. Under the influence of Italian art, his color became higher in key and his brushwork grew progressively more fluent. In the picture herewith, Christ is seated at the left with His head raised and tumed in profile toward the right. His hair is long, He wears a red robe and a gray-blue cloak is thrown over one shoulder, to fall on one knee. This right hand, showing the mark of the nail on the cross rests on the table, holding the bread. A pilgrim in foreground, extending his arm in surprise at Christ, wears a dark blue blouse. The man with full beard, across the table, is in dark brown. A gray wall forms
