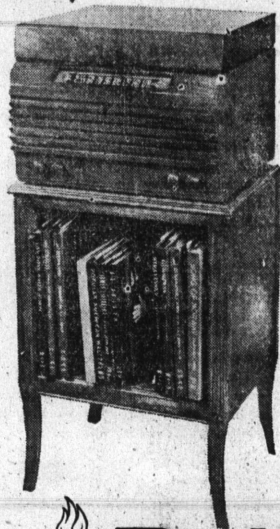

## Charter Given Technocracy Group In City

Saturday evening, at the Men's Bible Class building, the Torrance section of Technocracy, Inc., held a dinner social. The event was the "Presentation of an Official Charter" by Continental Headquarters, Technocracy, Inc.

He had handled settling of industrial disputes; presenting the Navy's case to the War Manpower Commission; handling disciplinary action, hiring and firing. He was in charge of the training program for mechanics.

Following his return from Naval service, one of his first assignments at Corona was to promote a bond issue of \$575,000 which carried seven to one after having failed to carry three months previously.

The Corona district is of comparable size to the Torrance district, with 2900 students from kindergarten thru high school. He is well known throughout the state in educational circles, is married and intends to move to Torrance in the near future.

According to Dr. Wood, Superintendent Hull's choice was one of unanimous action by the Board of Education. He has been retained on a short contract starting at once to end June 30 and a four-year contract required by law to extend from July 1, 1947, to June 30, 1951. He will be paid \$10,000 a year, with the contract containing a provision for adjustment upward, according to Dr. Wood.

Screening the candidates for this position, and also that of business manager-purchasing agent which will be filled shortly, were Dr. C. C. Carpenter, assistant county school superintendent; Dr. Irving R. Melbo, of University of Southern California, and Dr. Lloyd N. Morrisett, of University of California at Los Angeles.
