New Murder Charge Holds Mrs. McKenzie

Ruth (Sunny) McKenzie, charged with murder in the knifing slaying of her fiancé, Jack C. Floyd, was freed momentarily Monday when City Judge John A. Shidler ruled on a technicality in the preliminary hearing of the case in Torrance City Court.

Judge Shidler freed Miss McKenzie on motion of defense counsel after the attorneys and Deputy District Attorney George Kemp had clashed concerning the establishment of legal evidence of criminal action.

Miss McKenzie was immediately rearrested and a new murder complaint filed with the district attorney's office. At her arraignment before Judge Edwin L. Jefferson, in Los Angeles, a new hearing was set for Friday.

South Torrance Sewer Project Is Abandoned

The South Torrance sewer project was abandoned by the City Council Tuesday night on recommendation of Harold A. Barnett, consulting engineer, and G. M. Jain, city engineer. They explained that since the protests exceeded 50 percent, the city is bound by the debt limitation act to reject the project.

However, City Engineer Jain recommended that a new survey be made within the area, which indicates it will favor formation of a sewer district, and that plans proceed for such a smaller district.

Many home owners in South Torrance have experienced serious trouble with cesspools during winter months. It was pointed out, and they are desirous of securing sanitary sewers.

Charles Gotts Operates Vurp's Restaurant

The restaurant at Vurps again is under the management and control of Charles Gotts, owner of the popular Daniels Cafe at 1625 Cabrillo avenue.

Gotts announced Monday that he had assumed control of Vurp's restaurant under an arrangement with Leo Katz, of the Torrance Cafe Corporation.

Gotts had operated the restaurant a year or so ago, for a short period.

The same good food featured at Daniels will be served at Vurp's, according to "Charlie."

J. E. Young Given Walteria Water Line Contract

J. E. Young, with a bid of \$25,622.50, was given a contract by the City Council Tuesday night to build the 12-inch and 10-inch water line from Metropolitan mains in Lomita to Walteria.

Young's bid was more than \$7,000 under the estimate of Taylor & Taylor on the cost of the project, but considerably more than the estimates given at the meeting of the City Council March 25. It was explained that an error was made in Pacific Pipe Line Construction Company's bid of approximately \$11,000.

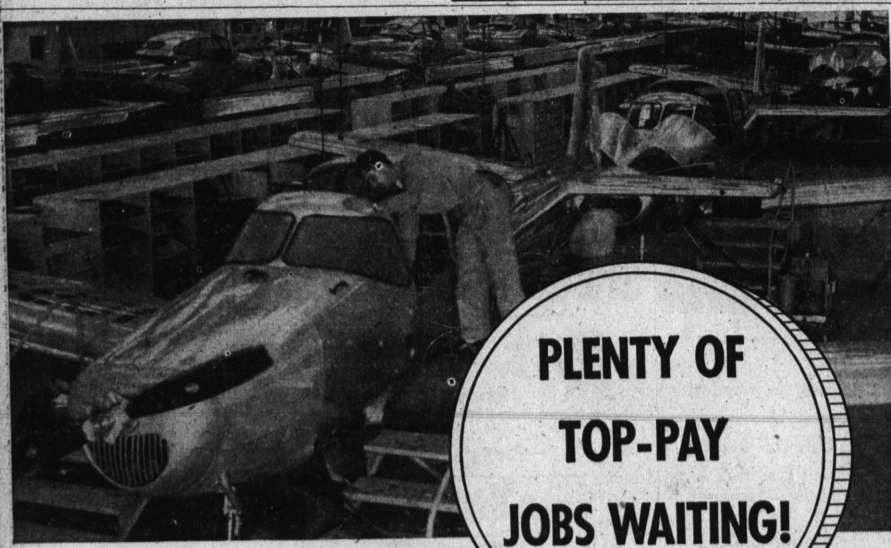
