**Torrance Total 1947 Building Over Two Million**

City of Torrance building records reveal that for the first quarter of 1947, total construction permits issued amount to more than twice the total for the same period of 1946.

For the three months of 1947, permits reached the amount of \$2,194,196. This compares with \$913,032 for the same period of last year.

In 1947, 63 new dwellings have been authorized, and while this amount is relatively high for individual homes, a number of new subdivisions are about to undertake mass home-building activity which will amount to several hundred new homes this year.

The March building total this year was \$113,790, with 11 new dwelling units authorized. February was \$157,450, with 17 new dwelling units. January was \$1,992,986, with 36 units for dwellings authorized. The American Radiator and Standard Sanitary Corp., permit of \$1,500,000 was taken out during that month.

**County Would Purchase More Floor Space**

Negotiations for the purchase of the Fashion League building located on the northeast corner of Hill st. and Second will be entered into immediately, according to Raymond V. Darby, chairman of the Board of Supervisors.

The building under the present ownership of John M. Stahl is desired by the county to relieve the terrific space shortage which has caused such hardship.

Darby stated that the board at its Tuesday meeting had instructed County Manager Wayne Allen to purchase the building if it could be had for \$450,000 on the condition that 24,000 square feet, in addition to the space now occupied by the county, can be available for county use within 90 days.

"The public continues to be very cooperative in avoiding making any but urgent calls in Torrance and Lomita," A. B. Smith, district manager, said. "The company regrets the inability to handle all calls, but as the emergency force of operators improves with practice and more persons become available to operate switchboards, they will gradually improve the service."

believe that our recommendations are too severe to be attainable within two decades. We must, however, face the fact that the population growth of this area has so far outstripped available hospital facilities that only drastic action will ever bring hospital service here in line with the needs."

Hamilton declared that in addition to doubling the current number of Los Angeles county's 40,000 hospital beds by the year 1970, more than two-thirds of the existing facilities must be reorganized to come up to the general standard set for 1970. "Only 32 percent of the existing hospital units now in operation qualify to continue to function as before under the recommendations," Hamilton said.

Hamilton, who with his associates has been working on the survey since last spring, will present his complete building program recommendations to the survey committee April 29.
