directed by Holmes that brought initial criticism to the field, officials pointed out. This consisted of buying surplus airplanes, reconditioning them and then selling the planes.

The "administrative group" collected tie-down fees, hangar rental, sold gasoline to private plane owners and conducted other business allied with Holmes' and his set-up.

This was permitted under the terms of the purported five-year lease which Holmes secured from the U. S. Engineers.

While the City of Torrance has gone on record as favoring the cadet training program of the C.A.P., the order cancelling the five-year lease included an order for the C.A.P. to evacuate the field.

Holmes Thursday removed the balance of his property from the field, flying his own personal airplane to Torrance Community Airport, in North Torrance.

There are some 100 airplanes now tied down at the field, and it is reported that tie-down fees and other commercial operations "wrote off" approximately \$3,500 of the \$5,500 that the Lomita business men put into Holmes' program. They spent an additional approximate \$2,800 in rent, it was said.

Mayor Sherkey said this week that it is his recommendation that all planes on the field owned by private parties remain there pending clarification of the status of the application of the City of Torrance for permission to occupy the field, either by permit, lease or outright ownership.

CONSTRUCTION WORK GOES FORWARD ON PROJECTS FOR 417 NEW HOMES THIS YEAR

Construction of 417 housing units in three new tracts will be under way within the next few weeks, according to City Engineer G. M. Jain. Their occupancy will mean a population gain to Torrance within this year of more than 1200 persons, including an estimated 400 children of school age, it is estimated.

Aerial Parade To Highlight Walteria Fete

A dazzling aerial parade will highlight Memorial services to be conducted for Walteria's war dead Sunday, May 25, beginning at 1:30 p.m.

Headed by Brig. Gen. Leonard E. Thoburn and featuring several noted war flyers, the 62nd Wing, California National Guard, will parade. Lt. Col. Gabreski, top ace of the European theatre, plans to participate.

Brig. Gen. Daniel H. Hudelson, a assistant commander of the Guard for Southern California, and Clyde Cocker, survivor of the Bataan death march and Japanese prisoner for over three years, will speak.

A parade will start from the Walteria school, two blocks east of Hawthorne Blvd. on 101 highway at 1:30 and will proceed south on Ward St. to Newton, west to Hawthorne, north to 240th St. and west to the Walteria Recreation park.

Music

Music for the ceremony will be furnished by the Torrance Area Youth band under the leadership of James Van Dyck. The traditional blanket of flowers from the sky will be dropped from planes.

Line of march follows: Grand Marshal Gen. Hudelson and staff; Torrance Area Youth band; massed colors, veterans' organizations and auxiliaries; massed flags, veterans' organizations and auxiliaries; Walteria veterans; Boy Scouts; Girl Scouts and mounted visitors.

All veterans residing in Walteria are asked to be in uniform. Mounted visitors are invited to participate in the parade.

Introduction of new veteran residents of the community will be made after the ceremony.

Rough grading already is under way on the Kettler tract at Sepulveda Blvd. and Narbonne Avenue. Bulldozers and shovels are filling abandoned sumps, grading new streets and preparing for actual construction of 106 homes. A tract office has been erected at the Sepulveda-Narbonne intersection. This tract is completely financed, it was said. John Kettler is directing the work.

Jain revealed that rough grading is under way at the Hollywood Riviera tract of California-Nevada Properties Inc., and that the tract office already had been constructed at Calle Miramar and Hollywood-Palos Verdes Parkway. This firm will build 211 homes at once.

Sunhaven Properties, Inc., is preparing plans for 100 homes on the adjoining tract No. 10304 at Hollywood Riviera, according to Jain.

In addition, at Seaside Ranchos, Pacific Coast Highway and the Redondo-Torrance line, within the confines of Torrance, Ben Haggott has more than 100 homes under construction now, and several will be ready for occupancy by buyers next week.

Haggott is proceeding with the construction program there, and will build a total of 156 this year, it is said.

This will mean that by early 1948 these tracts will have provided a total of 563 new homes for Torrance, Jain estimated.
